
# THE STEWARD

Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time SEPTEMBER 3, 2023







Our readings this weekend are ones to challenge us. In the Gospel reading Jesus begins by letting the disciples know of the fate that is awaiting him. He mentions the mistreatment and death that is coming. He does also mention his resurrection, but you wonder

if the disciples heard him say it. Peter quickly rebukes this message. He cannot believe such terrible things could come into Christ's life. Jesus responds by telling Peter that he is thinking like a human being and not seeing things the way God sees them. He then says that famous line: "For whoever wishes to come after me must take up his cross and follow me".

These are hardly encouraging words. They can make one question if this is such a good idea after all. This way of life sounds very challenging and difficult. Why would anyone want to do this.

Our other readings make it clear that anyone who followed God learned of the struggle that would be a part of their life. Look at our first reading which comes from the prophet Jeremiah. Poor Jeremiah loved God deeply. He kept warning the Southern Kingdom that they needed to change their ways, or they would be facing exile at the hands of the Babylonians. Their future would be dismal if they did not look to change. He loved God's people as well and hated to see what was going to be their future. But try as he would, he was met by derision, scorn, and attempts on his life. He expressed his frustration in our first reading, even saying to God: "You duped me!" But he knew he had to give the message from God. He said that if he tried to be silent, the Word would be like a fire in his heart.

In the second reading St. Paul says to the Romans that they should offer themselves as a living sacrifice. He tells the community not to conform themselves to the present age but to be transformed by Christ and to transform the world.

Jesus then lays down the reason for being willing to endure "the cross" in our lives. He points out that even if we compromised ourselves so much as to "gain the whole world", we would lose our lives. That is, he was pointing out we would end up giving away our lives because we would no longer be standing for something that mattered. And in the end when all

of this in the world comes to an end, we will stand before God to receive the blessings God will have ready for us. We will see and experience the gifts that we were living for, not temporary fame

This then becomes the challenge we face. Like the disciples we must ask how much I am willing to stand up for what God has taught us and is inviting us to follow. It becomes easy in this world to compromise ourselves to be successful, or to be liked. But ultimately, we will end up having to face ourselves. Looking carefully at what we have become we will find ourselves asking if this is truly what I wanted to be. Is the way I am living, and what I am living for something I am proud of. Much more important than success, fame, or wealth is integrity and authenticity.

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I am glad I was duped. Yep, the illusionist in the show we attended had me fooled into seeing something one way and it turns out it was completely false. The show was entertaining, and worth the time and expense we invested to enjoy it. And ... it may be the only circumstance where the word "duped" can be used in the same sentence as "glad." That certainly wasn't Jeremiah's experience! His prayer reflects frustration and hurt, and even a little bit of disgust at how he has been treated because of the Lord: "I say to myself, I will not mention him, I will speak in his name no more." But then, even in his discontent and disillusion, he holds on to the truth. For right after this rebellious admission, he confesses that the need to prophesy "becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones; I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it." He knows he was never really duped there was no lie from the Lord. And the fact is, he believes and trusts in the Lord enough to pray to him in the first place; even in his prayer of lament he is praising the Lord as God and redeemer. Jeremiah's example is a good one for us: Never lose sight of the Lord as our God. Pray to him; give over our frustrations to him; and allow him to be the fire burning in our heart that we cannot quench.

#### **GO EVANGELIZE**

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Reading today's Gospel leaves me feeling awkward and even embarrassed for St. Peter. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, calling the first pope Satan and telling Peter to get behind him - super embarrassing, especially when Peter had good intentions in trying to protect Jesus. What's the old saying, "The road to hell is paved with good intentions"? There's another axiom, a little less dire but just as pointed: "People judge you by your actions, not your intentions. You may have a heart of gold, but so does a hard-boiled egg." Intentions matter - but how we enact and employ those intentions are important, too. Christ tells us in today's Gospel, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." Faith in God, believing in his promises, and wanting to obey his commandments are wonderful and essential - and they are the foundation of a life lived for Christ. But they are not the entirety of it, and while denying ourselves and taking up our cross is never easy, it is necessary. "What profit would there by for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" Christ asks. Let's pray for the grace of pure intentions and the strength to live them in service to the Lord.

PRAY Heavenly Father, uncover my eyes and reveal any obstacles keeping me from thinking as you do. Give me the courage to overcome these obstacles, and grant me the strength to take up my cross and follow you, even in the face of difficulty. I ask this through your Son, Christ our Lord.

#### Sunday, Sep 03, 2023

#### It's a wonderful life

Our days are engulfed in chaos, conflict, and dispiriting news. Then along comes a director like Frank Capra (1897-1991), churning out what have been called "fantasies of good will," imposing order with his ragged little messiahs who take meaningful stands against king-sized injustices. A self-described "Christmas Catholic," Capra fought his moral battles on the silver screen. He believed each person is "essentially good, a living atom of divinity.... Films must be made to say these things, to counteract the violence and the meanness, to buy time to demobilize the hatreds." Take your stand. Tell a story of hope.

#### Monday, Sep 04, 2023

#### Come aside and rest awhile

In a Prayer for Labor Day, the U.S. bishops invite us to ask God: "Make a place in our hearts for compassion to the men and women who labor tirelessly for basic necessities." Labor has always held a place of dignity within our faith. Scripture tells us that the laborer is worthy of his hire (1 Tim. 5:18), and many a church document, including Rerum Novarum, outline the value of workers and their work: "Justice, therefore, demands that the interests of the working classes should be carefully watched over, so that they who contribute so largely to the advantage of the community may themselves share in the benefits which they create." And, today, in honor of our labor, it's time to take a break.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18; Luke 4:16-30 (431). "Is this not the son of Joseph?"

#### Tuesday, Sep 05, 2023

#### The first daughter of charity

It's not every day that a Catholic saint is honored with a United Nations resolution. But then, Mother Teresa is hardly an everyday saint. The U.N. honored the famous nun from Kolkata, known the world over for her hands-on care of the poor, with a resolution in 2013. It declared that on the September 5th anniversary of Mother Teresa's death each year, the world would now observe an International Day of Charity. Let's take her at her word: "Love is not patronizing and charity isn't about pity, it is about love. Charity and love are the same—with charity you give love, so don't just give money but reach out your hand instead."

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6, 9-11; Luke 4:31-37 (432). "All of you are children of the light and children of the day. We are not of the night or of darkness."

#### Wednesday, Sep 06, 2023

#### Pray for the persecuted and forgotten

On this day, many Christians of the Eastern tradition celebrate the feast of Saint Donatian and his companions, a group of lesserknown fifth-century martyrs driven out of North Africa by the Arian King Huneric, who persecuted a great many Trinitarians for their faith. Though we may not today face death for our confession, many of our brothers and sisters around the world do, and it is for them that we must pray with the help of Donatian and all who died for the name of Christ. Even more, we are tasked to help them materially if we can, since—as the Lord says—whatsoever we do for the least of his siblings, we do for him.

TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:1-8; Luke 4:38-44 (433). "We have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love that you have for all the holy ones because of the hope reserved for you in heaven."

#### Thursday, Sep 07, 2023

#### School days, Golden Rule days

It's back-to-school season. Learning is foundational to our democracy and also to informed faith. In 2,000 years' time, Christianity has overcome countless heresies (a type of twisting of the belief) and accumulated many saints, martyrs, stories, and traditions. With school back in session, consider sending yourself to "school" to learn more about your own religion. Check out study materials from the U.S. Catholic bishops and formed.org, a program both individuals and parishes can use for faith formation. Make a choice to grow in wisdom and understanding.

TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:9-14; Luke 5:1-11 (434). "Put out into deep water and lower your nets for a catch."

#### Friday, Sep 08, 2023

#### A nativity set for the ages

The church officially celebrates three Nativities: the Nativity of Jesus, the Son of God (Christmas); the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist (24 June); and the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary (8 September). These events tell us everything we need to know about God, faith, and the path to salvation. Through Jesus' Incarnation, we learn that God is with us-always and everywhere. Through John's witness we come to understand that we are not God—not even close—and we must prepare ourselves to welcome God's great goodness into our lives. And through Mary, we are shown the meaning of true discipleship—how to answer God's call and follow Christ through the joyful, sorrowful, and luminous mysteries of our lives in faith. Celebrate this dynamic trio by living in their light.

FEAST OF THE NATIVITY OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY TODAY'S READINGS: Micah 5:1-4a or Romans 8:28-30; Matthew 1:1-16, 18-23 (636). "They shall name him Emmanuel, which means 'God is with us."

#### **Saturday, Sep 09, 2023**

#### Give us this day some peace

"Racism has been part of the social fabric of America since its European colonization. Whether it be the tragic past of Native Americans, Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, or Blacks, the story is one of slavery, peonage, economic exploitation, brutal repression, and cultural neglect." This observation from the 1979 bishops' pastoral Brothers and Sisters to Us is why the church in the United States has established today as a "Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities" to promote healing of the racial divides of our nation. Make an honest examination of conscience regarding your thoughts, words, and deeds toward people of other ethnic and racial backgrounds.

MEMORIAL OF PETER CLAVER, PRIEST TODAY'S READINGS: Colossians 1:21-23; Luke 6:1-5 (436). "You once were alienated and hostile in mind because of evil deeds."

# How to Find an Affordable Domestic Violence Lawyer


Finding an affordable domestic violence attorney is a challenge, but it's not impossible, and it greatly improves a curriver's change of actting justice.

and it greatly improves a survivor's chance of getting justice

Many survivors of domestic abuse will find themselves trying to navigate the court system at some point. Whether it's for an order of protection, a divorce, a criminal case, a child custody arrangement or a civil suit, a courtroom may be in your future. And going at it alone can be overwhelming. Attorneys can be valuable resources as long as you can find one knowledgeable in domestic violence whose fees won't bankrupt you. That can be the tricky part—finding affordable legal aid.

#### Do I Need a Lawyer For My Domestic Abuse Case?

This is undoubtedly the first question you need to ask yourself. You can represent yourself in court but it takes a lot more preparation and work. It can also be intimidating if you have to face your abusive partner in a courtroom.




#### As an Abuse Survivor, Where Can I Find Affordable Legal Aid?

The following resources can help you find free advice from qualified legal professionals that can help you determine if you even need a lawyer, what kind of lawyer would be best, advice on how to represent yourself in court, how to fill out forms or file certain motions, how to get restitution (financial compensation for damages or injuries) or answer other questions you have.

- The Department of Justice has a list of pro bono legal service providers by state. Just make sure to ask a potential attorney the right questions in order to ensure a good fit with your case.
- Lawhelp.org helps connect people throughout the U.S. with legal resources and attorneys, as well as offering free legal guides on a number of topics.
- Legal Aid Societies exist in most states to provide free legal services for low-income individuals.
- Avvo.com features legal guidance for domestic violence questions and has a directory of lawyers by state or area of practice.
- The Battered Women's Justice Project contains a wealth of information and resources for survivors and their attorneys concerning every imaginable aspect of domestic violence. Although the name of the project has the word "women" in it, the materials are relevant to all who are impacted by domestic violence (including trafficking and coercive control).
- The Syms Legal Momentum Gender Equality Helpline is a resource for anyone looking for legal help that focuses on sex and gender discrimination, violence or harassment. They cannot assist with family law or protective orders.
- FreeFrom's Compensation Compass helps survivors determine what financial restitution they might be eligible for based on their state and the crimes committed against them as the result of an abuser. Financial abuse is one of the main ways abusers keep survivors trapped with them indefinitely, so any way that survivors can become more financially secure will help them get to a safer life more quickly.
- WomensLaw.org, a website of the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV), has a list of state laws, local organizations and even court forms that may be able to help you with your specific concerns. Their motto: "Plain language legal information for victims of abuse."
- The Legal Services Corporation is a nonprofit established by Congress to help provide financial support for civil legal aid to low-income Americans.
- The American Bar Association's Free Legal Answers page allows individuals to ask a legal question and get it answered by volunteer attorneys.
- The Immigrant Legal Resource Center offers help to immigrant citizens about their legal rights in a number of different areas including the U Visa program.
- **Indigenous and military service members** are two groups that operate under their own legal systems separate from the rest of the population. Survivors may face different barriers to receiving justice in those legal systems.
- Your local domestic violence nonprofit may have more legal resources available specific to your state, and often know attorneys who have worked with other survivors.
