Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. This Sunday's readings bring us to the end of the Liturgical Year.

As we celebrate the end of our Liturgical year, I am reminded that there are many ways living a life

of faith is counter cultural. I would like to focus today, on two small ways that surfaced in my reflection on today's readings.

First thought; Our church celebrates the end of the Liturgical year proclaiming; Christ is Our King and then we enter the season of Advent.

In Advent, we begin by remembering the story of Jesus birth, again. We share the story of Jesus life death and resurrection in our new Liturgical year that starts usually, the last weekend of November.

Culturally, we end our year in December and look to initiate better habits with the beginning of the new year, in January. We evaluate where we could make changes in our behavior to potentially, become better people.

Couldn't we, as followers of Christ. make our New Year resolutions with the beginning of Advent?

Second thought; Trophies and award are valued as moments of affirmation in our secular world. The bigger the trophy, the more ornate the award, the more our worth is confirmed.

Yet, today we celebrate Christ the

King. Christ, who wore no crown. Christ whose body depicted on the cross looks to most, to be a symbol of defeat, of loss.

Many standing around the cross during the crucifixion saw Jesus on the cross as a failure. In the passage from the Gospel of Luke, some of those people mock him. They ridicule Jesus in his

suffering.

St. Dismas recognizes Christ's kingship. He not only notes that Jesus is not a criminal. He implores Jesus to remember him when he comes into his kingdom. On that day at Calvary, many voices remained silent; others jeered. Only the thief's voice rose to the defense of the innocent victim of suffering. His was a brave profession of faith. The gift of faith is better than any trophy and yet, it often goes unnoticed.

The Sign of the Cross then becomes a prayer that proclaims our faith in the cross of Jesus, a symbol of victory. Jesus' Resurrection transformed a symbol of shame into a means of reconciliation with God.

When we acknowledge Christ the King, do we realize and behave as if Christ is the King of our life? Do decisions and behaviors align with what we profess to believe?

Like Dismas, Jesus invites us into His kingdom, He desires us to be with Him in paradise.

How do we, how will we respond, to Christ's desire for us?

Will we dismiss Jesus' invitation to practice our faith with the hope of eternal life? It's not easy to live counter to culture but, it is what we are called to do as followers of Christ.

This Advent starts the year anew. Begin this new liturgical season with a commitment to profess your faith in action, every day.

The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

2 Sm 5:1-3 | Col 1:12-20 | Lk 23:35-43

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Did you watch Queen Elizabeth's funeral procession? The Imperial State Crown that sat atop her coffin is "made of gold and set with 2,868 diamonds, 17 sapphires, 11 emeralds, 269 pearls, and 4 rubies," according to the Historic Royal Palaces website. It had been made for her father, King George VI, for his 1937 coronation. It is hard to reconcile this bejeweled crown with the crown of thorns worn by Jesus at his crucifixion. Yet we recognize the crucified Christ as the king of kings, the firstborn of creation, above "thrones or dominions or principalities or powers." As we conclude the liturgical year, we are reminded that the cross, not the crown, is the primary symbol of Christ's power. By embracing the cross – through service, sacrifice and recognizing Jesus as the king of our lives – we can help bring about his kingdom.

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

It can be easy to distance ourselves from the two condemned criminals crucified alongside Jesus, much the way we might write off the prisoners in our midst today. Yet Luke's telling reveals their humanity and our shared human nature. One reacts as any of us might, telling Jesus to "save himself." The other speaks words of faith, recognizing Jesus as the Son of God, our true king of the universe. As we prepare to enter Advent, let us ask God for the grace to recognize Jesus as our king. Soon we will be swept up in the Christmas countdown. By placing Christ, the newborn king, at the center of our lives, we can in turn help ourselves and those close to us slow down and experience Advent in such a way so as to fully prepare for his coming.

PRAY This week, make the words of the second criminal your prayer: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

Ready for the ride of your life?

Just as Catholics celebrate the conception, birth, and presentation in the temple of Jesus, we celebrate the same events in the life of Mary. God's plans (for all of us) begin and unfold before anyone's understanding of them. The story of Mary's presentation in the temple comes from a non-biblical text that says Mary's parents consecrated her to God at a very young age. With her Immaculate Conception, God set her on the path to a pivotal role in salvation history, but it required dedication and preparation nonetheless culminating in her immortal "yes" at the Annunciation. Life hands us circumstances, and sometimes decisions are made that are beyond our control—have you considered how those might shape your purpose? Commit to following where the Spirit might lead you.

Speak up

Once Saint Paul's letters were collected in the third century, he got heat from Christians for "Wives, be submissive to your husbands"—adding that neither should they speak in church. For the third century also saw the martyrdom of Saint Cecilia. Paul's critics pointed out that Cecilia's eloquent words persuaded her husband and led him (and others) to convert. As for not speaking in church? It was Cecilia who allowed an underground church to worship in her home. Cecilia's story is told in Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, recounted by a nun who praises her for evangelizing with both words and example. Men *and* women of faith, glorify God today with your own words and example!

From one of those letters comes advice that's fitting for Americans celebrating Thanksgiving tomorrow: "If you are wise, then display your wisdom by good deeds; and if you are modest, let others speak of your modesty instead of proclaiming the fact yourself. To God we owe everything, and therefore on every count we are under obligation to thank him."

Thursday, Nov 24, 2022 Saved in the cloud

Thanksgiving is a time to recall the blessings in our lives. Most who are reading these words can give thanks to God for the freedom to worship, something absent for the saints and martyrs memorialized on this date. Today's memorial is unusual in that it honors 117 Vietnamese martyrs, the "companions" of Father Andrew Dũng-Lạc. In fact, those 117 actually represent the 100,000 to 300,000 Vietnamese Christians killed or severely persecuted for their faith between the 17th and 19th centuries. May your actions of gratitude today give honor to this "cloud of witnesses."

Called to speak out

The early church was a place of great religious fervor and danger. Prior to 313 Christianity was outlawed, and many adherents were put to death. This was the age of the martyrs, including Catherine of Alexandria. Catherine was well educated and known for her keen intellect. As she grew in the faith, she became an outspoken critic of the dominant religion of the Roman empire. Though given many unconscionable "outs" to avoid death, Catherine held firmly to her beliefs and continued to speak out. What compels you to speak out, even when it costs you?



What to Do If Your Teen or Adult Child Is Abusive

When a grown child abuses a parent, things can get complicated. Here's what to know:

What Can Parents Do If Their Child Is Abusive?

There are several steps parents can take if their child is exhibiting abusive behavior, depending on the actions and how long it's been going on. The biggest challenge for most parents is acknowledging the problem. To get help, parents need to admit they are in a situation that could be harmful physically, psychologically or financially and that they need help.

Here's what parents can do:

- Identify unacceptable behaviors and set consequences. At the earliest signs of abuse, it's essential to outline what behaviors are acceptable and what are not.
- Allow an expression of emotions. Teach kids about healthy ways to express "big" emotions and, particularly in boys, what healthy masculinity looks like.
- Connect the child with professional help. If the behavior accelerates and parents or other family members are fearful, you may need to seek help to address mental health or substance abuse issues. These things do not cause abuse but can exacerbate abusive behavior.
- Seek counseling or therapy for yourself. Parents need to get support for both the child and themselves.
- Talk to the juvenile systems in your area. If your child is still a teenager, some programs can help them learn to cope and manage their behavior. If you're not sure where to start, try a local school.
- If you're not safe, call the police. That's so hard on parents. But sometimes that's the best thing that can be done.
- Reach out to Adult Protective Services. If you're 60 or older, you can connect with help in every state.
- Create a safety plan. Safety planning is essential, particularly if a teen or adult child is physically abusive.
