

When we read these encouraging words from Jesus and think about our prayers, we can think that the meaning behind the words is that you can ask Jesus to give you anything you want and then be guaranteed to receive it. We know that God loves us and wants to bless us, but we also have to understand that He wants to do so in ways that are truly best for us.

When we make a request of God in prayer, do we pray for God's will as well? Are we open to receiving what's truly best for us from a loving God even though it may turn out to be different than we could ever imagine?

When the disciples asked Jesus to teach them how to pray and He shared with them the Our Father prayer, do we take the time to really understand the words of that prayer every time we say it? As we say "thy kingdom come, thy will be done," do we really want God's will for us even if is different than our own vision of what needs to be happening in our lives?

As I reflect on the gospel passage for today, I realize that I need to understand that the deeper purpose of prayer is to learn how to align my will with God's. I know that often my prayers focus on what will make life easier but I know that God wants me to grow spiritually and that may mean a more

difficult path. I know that instead of putting all my efforts into asking for things, my prayer efforts would be better spent trying to become closer to God, to become more like Him.

Rather than going through life focusing on what I think I want for my life, my focus is now more what does He want from my life? What is His divine plan for me? What do I need to do with the gifts He has given me to make this world a better place, to fulfill my part of His mission? When aligning my goals with God's will, I know I have to be willing to take a path that I wouldn't have chosen for myself. It may be more challenging and may cause some pain, but I can be at peace because I know that He only wants what is best for me.

I also have to remember that God's timing is not always my timing, and that I need to have patience and have trust that He has heard my prayer and is working on what is best for the situation. Having this confidence in that He is listening and knows my need, I can let go of the anxiety and take one day at a time, always asking Him to help me discern the next steps in alignment with His will.

Prayer is so powerful and making the effort to pray is so necessary, especially in our world today with all the challenges we face. At the beginning of the pandemic, a group of us at St Ben's gathered together on Zoom to pray

the Scriptural Rosary. It has been such a gift and we still gather today. As each person takes a turn in praying a decade, they begin their prayer with any request that they may personally have, any request that has been given to them by others, or any concern in our world that we all hold in our hearts. Being able to vocalize our intentions together is so powerful and provides the peace that only God can provide. When we realize that we are not alone, that He walks with us and hears our prayers, we can live in confidence that He is in charge

and that He will help us to discern the next best steps, no matter what the challenge is we are facing.

I hold many prayers in my heart for our faith community here at St. Ben's, such as praying for families to enroll their children in Religious Ed, for us to be able to have RCIA and encourage people to join the faith. I pray that we will have people that wish to use their gifts by serving as catechists and be part of sharing their faith with our young people.

I pray that our parish and school become places where families of faith can grow spiritually – both personally and as a community; where we experience a profound and personal encounter with Jesus Christ through His Church; where we can fulfill our desire for mission and service; where we feel welcome, loved and a deep sense of belonging.

It is easy to become discouraged or worried that our prayers may not be answered in the way we want, but if we have confidence that the Holy Spirit will accomplish His work in presenting our prayers to the Father according to His perfect will and timing, and we can rest in the knowledge that He is working all things together for our good.

Truthfully speaking, prayer is the most powerful force or weapon on earth. We can be in one place and impact situations around the world simply by asking God to intervene. That's why it is important for us to make prayer a priority and not leave it on the back burner. When we do, we position ourselves to see God's power in operation, which will happen when his people pray. God's power activated in response to his people calling upon his name. So let us pray!



GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

I miss my friend, Carol, a second mother to many of us navigating young adulthood in one of my adopted hometowns. Carol offered wisdom and perspective – and binders full of recipes for any occasion. So, even after moving away, I knew that I could "Dial A Cook" at a moment's notice and Carol would drop everything and patiently dictate a recipe. Today's Gospel fills me with gratitude for Carol, who through her love and generosity hints at God's love and generosity toward us. Carol is with God now, so I still talk to her from time to time. Today's Gospel reminds us that, likewise, we can bring anything to our loving God in prayer, and the Father will listen and respond. We may think we can power through our days, and our lives, on our own, but Jesus reminds us to persist in prayer: "And I tell you, ask and you will receive; seek and you will find."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Remember the time before smartphones? When you needed a cup of flour or an egg, that meant knocking on a neighbor's door. Now we most often text ahead, making the request a bit less awkward. Well, despite the proliferation of Catholic and spiritual apps, praying still requires "putting ourselves out there" before God. While God knows all and sees all, it is up to us to bring our deepest needs and desires to him. Our smartphones can help us here: We can set a reminder to pray each morning and each evening. We can model our persistence in prayer to our children and others by praying with and for them, especially at times when they are struggling with something or facing a difficult choice or situation. If an earthly Mother or Father knows how to give good gifts to their children, after all, "how much more will the Father in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him?"

PRAY Recite the Lord's Prayer, understanding that God knows our needs and will give us each our daily bread.

She wrote, "Thinking of things to be done, hopes to be realized, persons to be helped, I say laughingly that I go to a multitude of funerals daily, burying so many deceased projects, so much of what I have had to let die and must bury without regret." On this, the anniversary of her death, pray for the grace to surrender to God when you are overwhelmed with busyness.

Take responsibility

Racial tension, economic unrest, and summer heat have fueled countless murderous altercations throughout America's short history. July 27, 1919 marks the start of one of the most violent and tragic race riots sparked by the stoning and drowning of a young black boy in Chicago who inadvertently swam into an area of Lake Michigan reserved for "whites only." By the end, 38 people were dead, 537 injured, and 1,000 families made homeless. These statistics are stacked upon decades before and after this date of

the extreme violence that plagues our nation. In their 1994 statement, *Confronting a Culture of Violence: A Catholic Framework for Action*, the U.S. Catholic Bishops conclude that "our society needs both more personal responsibility and broader social responsibility to overcome the plague of violence in our land and the lack of peace in our hearts."

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 15:10, 16-21; Matthew 13:44-46 (403). "I will free you from the hand of the wicked, and rescue you from the grasp of the violent."

Thursday, Jul 28, 2022

Divine by any name

An accomplished Catholic writer used to joke that "God" was the worst nickname ever: The term had acquired way too much baggage for him. Fortunately, the church has dozens of terms and metaphors for God, including the vivid image of God as potter. The reality of God is beyond any one term or comparison, so it is fortunate that the Christian tradition gives us so many. Light, Rock, Creator, Wisdom, Savior, Shepherd, Fortress, Vine, Shield, and on and on. What terms help bring God alive for you?

Friday, Jul 29, 2022

What friends are for

It's not easy to picture God as one of our friends. We can't just call God up to meet us for a cup of coffee. But friendship has many characteristics that help us better understand our own relationship with God. "Friendship," writes Pope Francis, "is no fleeting or temporary relationship, but one that is stable, firm and faithful, and matures with the passage of time. A relationship of affection that brings us together and a generous love that makes us seek the good of our friend" (*Christus vivit* §152). For further reflection, look to Jesus himself and his friends Martha, Mary, and Lazarus.

Peter Chrysologus (c.380–c.450) is the hands-down champion homilist of our tradition. Known as the "doctor of homilies," his name literally means "golden-tongued." Have you been moved by a great homily? Pope Francis (*Evangelii Gaudium, 135*) said that "The homily can actually be an intense and happy experience of the Spirit, a consoling encounter with God's word, a constant source of renewal and growth." Great homilies can be life changing, bringing about a deep conversion. May you encounter a great homily and be touched by the golden word of God.

Human Concerns



Abusers can use the internet to control and intimidate survivors through financial abuse, but there are ways to protect yourself

The internet is a crucial source of information and connection, but for survivors and victims of domestic violence, it can also present an opportunity for abusers to control, manipulate and endanger their victims. Victims and survivors of domestic violence report cyberstalking and financial fraud as a frequent form of abuse. Unfortunately, given abusers typically already have access to a great deal of their victim's personal information like Social Security Numbers, dates of birth, mailing addresses and more, succeeding in these tactics is often easier for a partner than for a hacker or faraway cybercriminal.

Use Strong Passphrases: Passwords and pins are used by an infinite number of websites and accounts as the first barrier to entry with most, making strong passwords incredibly important.

Use Credit, Not Debit Card: Perhaps the single most effective way to protect your finances digitally is giving up your debit card entirely. The benefits of paying with a credit card have nothing to do with the card's security defenses—but rather what happens to the user when a breach happens. Thanks to Zero Liability policies created by banks many years ago to encourage shopping online, resolving issues of credit fraud are often painless. With a debit card, however, this scenario is different.

Install Protective Software and Keep Your Device Updated: Use antivirus software, anti-spyware and a firewall on your computer. Be sure to install your computer's updates quickly—or automatically if possible. This will help ensure no ill-intentioned individuals—abusers or otherwise—can access or infiltrate your device.

Shred Documents With Sensitive Information: Whenever possible, don't leave behind documents with personal information. In the event of a move or relocation, set up mail forwarding so that credit card offers and other sensitive data reach only you and your family. If you're preparing to or have recently left an abuser, contact credit agencies and other companies with which you have accounts to notify them of the individual who should no longer have access to your information or account.

Explore Fraud Alerts: In the case of a lost wallet, for example, you might be suspicious that identity theft *will* occur—even if it hasn't, yet. Contact one of the three credit bureaus and ask them to set up a free fraud alert—the bureau you contact will notify the two others.

Freeze Your Credit: It's not uncommon for an abuser to access his or her victim's credit—whether to monitor reports for insights on financial or other recent activity or to open new lines of credit on the victim's behalf as a power and control tactic. While it can be inconvenient to freeze your credit, this is a great way to prevent identity thieves —or including abusers —from opening new lines of credit using your SSN.

VPN is **Essentia**l: Virtual private networks (VPNs) have been used in corporate environments for decades. Today, however, they are essential for consumers to protect communications, whether on a desktop, laptop or a mobile device. For victims or survivors of domestic violence, VPNs offer a safe, secure and anonymous way to browse the web, access accounts and make purchases.


