Way back in November of 2020, when the Covid shutdown was barely 8 months old, my wife, Ginger and I took a small window of opportunity to go visit my Mom out in Maryland. It had been a year since we had seen her and, with winter approaching, this would be our last chance to see her until Spring or perhaps even longer depending on the spread of Covid. But given the world we were living in and all the restrictions and precautions we were all dealing with, it was not as simple as making reservations, hopping on a plane, and driving a rental car home from the airport. Nothing was that simple anymore!

So beginning in October we began to formulate a plan – something that would be safe for us and for my 95 year old Mom. We decided the safest way to travel would be by car. So we would drive straight from Chicago to Maryland, roughly 750 miles, stopping only for gas and pit stops for a snack. We would quarantine ourselves for 2 weeks before that to ensure we were not bringing any other "passengers" with us. We would wear masks the entire time we were home, except for meals and we would not make any physical contact with Mom and my sister – no hugs, no kisses. We would spend the entire visit at home – no visits to stores or restaurants. We even shopped at Costco here in Chicago so that we could bring home all the household supplies we usually get to stock up my mom for the winter.

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We made sure our car would be ready for the journey and we got our cat-sitter to watch over our 2 senior citizen cats while we were gone. And we planned to make our return trip home to Chicago in the same manner – only necessary stops and driving straight through! We even

And when we did return home, we anxiously waited at home until we got the negative test results.

And then we pitched the whole plan to my mom – to make sure she was comfortable and felt safe with all the precautions we were taking! And she said YES!

Whew! Yes, that was a lot of work, a lot of preparation but in the end it was all worth it!

There are no rosy words or comforting remarks in today's Gospel. Jesus makes it very clear – being Christian, being a disciple demands effort and sacrifice. This is not a hobby or some weekend pastime. It is not something that just happens by accident. It takes time, planning, preparation, and work. And it means setting aside some things so that we can focus on what is most important – being a lifelong faithful disciple! It means setting priorities, turning your back on some things in order to focus on the most important!

So prepare! Prepare to build your tower of faith, knowing that you will have to turn your back on other projects and interests. And be prepared to battle against the forces of darkness and greed and selfishness, to suffer for the sake of eternal life. And that is what Jesus is addressing in today's Gospel – be prepared! Be prepared for the Kingdom, for the Master. You can't just sit around and then suddenly rush in a flurry of activity when the Master suddenly shows up. We need to approach every day as a day of preparation. Jesus makes it very clear – this is work and it's daily work.

Think about it! School has now been back in session for just a couple of weeks. Remember all the time and energy (and money) you have spent to prepare your kids for this new school year? Shopping for school supplies, new clothes/ uniforms! Trips to the grocery store for extra food to make for school lunch! Maybe even getting us up early weeks before school started so that we were back on schedule! And remember too all the times when we didn't plan ahead, when we didn't properly prepare! We rushed around on the last day trying and failing to get everything done. And it was a disaster. And we promised ourselves to plan better and longer the next year.

So what are we doing to prepare for the Kingdom??? What we doing today? Tomorrow? What plans are we making? Are we rushing at the last minute or are we spending time each and every day to prepare?

Great Spirit, teach me today to walk in prayer and to keep my faith strong!

### **ST. KATERI YOUTH MURAL PROJECT**

St. Kateri Center youth collaborated with The Mitchell Museum of the American Indian on a youth mural project. This past Friday August 26th in the evening we celebrated the unveiling of the new Native youth-designed mural. The special event included a recognition ceremony for the nine Native youth mural artists, followed by an open house and reception. Museum members and the public were invited to view the new youth mural, explore the Indigenous medicine garden, tour the collections, sample Native foods and meet local Native children's author Maria DesJarlait-Garcia. Maria is also one of St. Kateri Leadership Circle Members.

St. Kateri Center's Youth Coordinator, Negwes White co-facilitated with the Mitchell Museum on the project. The mural concept was entirely youth-driven and designed to reclaim space and share Indigenous knowledge and tells the Anishinaabe Creation Story with representations of nature and animals in the Woodland art style. The brightly colored mural will be displayed on the Mitchell Museum's front exterior facing Central Street in Evanston.

## Twenty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Wis 9:13-18b | Phmn 9-10, 12-17 | Lk 14:25-33

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Often, before writing these reflections, I take a minute to pray. I decided to add a minute of mindfulness using my new Apple Watch, which conveniently provides a meditation prompt. Today's happened to be: "Bring to mind a close relationship that can be challenging, and think about what it can teach you." Like those paper messages in fortune cookies, even this auto-generated prompt carried a grain of truth. Our thoughts may turn to our spouse, a prickly co-worker, or a moody teen. However, given today's readings, it struck me that this description can also fit our relationship with Jesus. Yes, we know that Jesus loves us, shepherds us, forgives us ... but he also challenges us! He reminds us today that being a disciple requires that we go all in, prepared to place our relationship with Jesus above all else. Easier said than done. But we can start, one minute at a time, with our prayers, priorities, and actions. We can also follow the example of saints such as Paul, imprisoned for preaching the Gospel, and the saints among us who teach us by example.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I bet we all know people we would consider saints, or at least well on their way: A compassionate friend, a priest or lay minister at our parish, a generous neighbor, that person who has not let suffering and loss shake their faith. Then there are the saints we Catholics celebrate each day: Francis, who threw off the cloak of privilege to live for Christ; Mother Teresa, who served others day in and day out even as she faced a spiritual drought; Paul, the one-time persecutor who built up the early Church and whose letters continue to inspire Christians. Each of them took Jesus' words at face value and laid down their lives for him. Learning how to be a disciple of Christ from studying the lives of the saints can be an ongoing pursuit throughout our lives. But perhaps we can also learn from a "living saint," if the opportunity presents itself, and ask, in so many words, "what's your secret?" It may be praying first thing in the morning, or something practical that we had not considered, such as managing their time in such a way that allows them to volunteer regularly or to be a continuous presence in the life of someone who needs them. If other priorities have gotten in the way of our relationship with Jesus, perhaps we can challenge ourselves to develop new habits. Even an incremental change - such as spending less time or money on nonessentials or reading an inspirational book - can help us reignite our faith and free up our time to focus on someone or something other than ourselves.

**STUDY** Take time to read about the lives of a few saints. What habits did they create to lead holy lives? What vices did they give up for Christ's sake to truly become his disciple?

#### Sunday, Sep 04, 2022

#### Value life above all

What does it mean to renounce possessions? Monastic tradition recognizes that even owning a spoon is spiritually dangerous if the spoon possesses us back. Most of us own far more than utensils. We might consider the example of Lutheran humanitarian Dr. Albert Schweitzer. He wasn't a perfect man nor a flawless theologian. Schweitzer got a lot wrong about his medical mission in Africa. But he got one thing very right: Reverence for life is paramount, and society's resources should serve life as its primary ethical foundation. Place your worldly treasure at the service of life.

#### Monday, Sep 05, 2022

#### Home is where the charity is

Today's commemoration of International Day of Charity got its start in Hungary to memorialize the death of Saint Mother Teresa (who died in 1997); the United Nations took it worldwide in 2012. The Missionaries of Charity, the order Mother Teresa founded with 12 members in 1950, continue her legacy by serving the "poorest of the poor." Now in 139 countries, the more than 5,000 sisters run orphanages and homes for those dying of AIDS, and care for refugees, the blind, disabled, aged, alcoholics, the poor and homeless, and victims of floods, epidemics, and famine. Despite the breadth of these efforts, Mother Teresa always said, "Love begins at home." Start your charitable activity there and watch where it takes you.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 5:1-8; Luke 6:6-11 (437). *"I ask you, is it lawful to do good on the sabbath rather than to do evil, to save life rather than to destroy it?"* 

#### Tuesday, Sep 06, 2022

#### Let the children come

With Labor Day ending the summer, today is the first day of classes for millions of U.S. schoolchildren. Christian fantasy writer Madeleine L'Engle—who died on this day in 2007—once made a keen observation, which is helpful as children's faith formation classes begin anew: "No wonder our youth [are] confused and in pain; they long for God, for the transcendent, and they are offered, far too often, either piosity or sociology, neither of which meets their needs." They encounter churches "which have become buildings that are a safe place to go to escape the awful [awesome] demands of God." Pray for parish religious ed programs today.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 6:1-11; Luke 6:12-19 (438). "Everyone in the crowd sought to touch him."

#### Wednesday, Sep 07, 2022

#### Honor those who preserved the treasure

On this day in 1303, Pope Boniface VIII was attacked in his hometown of Anagni, Italy, where he was sought out for his refusal to grant favors to the French monarchy. He briefly escaped with the help of the townsfolk, but died three weeks later in Rome, refusing to back down in the face of the monarch's attempts to control the church. Pray for all those who have faced persecution and even death so that we could worship freely and without fear.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 7:25-31; Luke 6:20-26 (439). "Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man."

#### Thursday, Sep 08, 2022

#### Born free

Catholics have dozens of ways to honor Mary, and today's celebration of her birth fits into that larger picture of love and reverence. Today's date is nine months after the December 8 Feast of the Immaculate Conception and is also meant to celebrate Mary's sinless condition from her very beginning. Today's feast day tends to fly below the radar in the U.S. church, but in Mangalore, India, Catholics hold flower-festooned processions, pray novenas, and prepare festive meals. It's a good day anywhere to consider Mary's radical embrace of her calling and ask her help to do the same in our lives.

FEAST OF THE NATIVITY OF MARY

TODAY'S READINGS: Micah 5:1-4a or Romans 8:28-30; Matthew 1:1-16, 18-23 (636). *"She will bear a son and you are to name him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."* 

#### Friday, Sep 09, 2022

#### Check for blind spots

Saint Peter Claver, S.J. (1580-1654) spent most of his life in Cartagena, Columbia ministering to enslaved people arriving at the ports. He left a lasting legacy that inspired the formation of the Knights of Peter Claver, the largest African-American Catholic fraternal order in the United States; the Apostles of the Sea, who continue to minister to seafarers around the world; and the Missionary Sisters of St. Peter Claver, who serve the poor, particularly in Africa. However, like any of us—even saints—Peter had his blind spots. Though he worked tirelessly to serve those arriving in shackles, he himself enslaved people. Many Catholics at the time spoke out against slavery; Peter did not, nor did the majority of the Catholic hierarchy. Enlightenment takes time. Like Peter Claver, show compassion as you strive for clearer vision.

MEMORIAL OF PETER CLAVER, JESUIT PRIEST TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 9:16-19, 22b-27; Luke 6:39-42 (441). "Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?"

### Saturday, Sep 10, 2022

#### Help the pain

Since 2003, World Suicide Prevention Day has been observed by dozens of countries. Hosted by the International Association for Suicide Prevention, the World Federation for Mental Health, and the World Health Organization, today is marked by activities designed to make people aware of the human cost of suicide and the means of prevention. For instance, by some estimates, 22 American service veterans take their own lives every day. We've got to do everything in our power to help these souls who have been so damaged by the horror of war. Check with your local VA to see how you can help.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 10:14-22; Luke 6:43-49 (442). "Why do you call me, 'Lord, Lord,' but not do what I command?"

# What Is Stalking? Part3

More on the warning signs, escalation indicators and barriers survivors face to get a stalker to stop

From the Domestic Violence Outreach Team at St Benedict Parish

### What If I'm Not Sure If I'm Being Stalked?

Is part of you trying to talk yourself out of believing you're being stalked? That can be a normal defense mechanism. If it's not happening, we don't need to be afraid of it, right?

Listening to your gut feelings at a time like this is vitally important, especially if someone else tries to minimize what's happening. Be it a close friend, a family member or even a police officer-if someone is telling you to "just ignore it," it's not always the best advice.



In "Listen To Your Gut," Bob Martin, retired Los Angeles Police Department captain turned senior advisor for Gavin de Becker & Associates, told DomesticShelters.org, "Victims will say, 'I should have known better.' I say, 'But, you did.'" It's not a guilt trip, assures Martin, it's all to say that if someone creeps you out, "other people's opinions don't matter. You don't have to figure out why he [or she] creeps you out, either."

You might want to look at our collection of assessment tools. By answering a few questions, you can better see what level of danger you might be facing from a stalker or partner.

### Stalking Can Take a Toll

"We know that many individuals who experience stalking experience a toll on their physical and mental wellbeing," says Landhuis. "Many survivors feel very isolated and finding someone to support them is vital to their wellbeing."

Research shows that victims of stalking suffer much higher rates of depression, anxiety, insomnia and social dysfunction than people in the general population, especially since nearly a third of stalking victims say they fear the stalking will never stop.

Finding a support group, a therapist or even just a trusted friend or family member to talk to can make a world of difference. Practice self-care methods that alleviate stress for you, whether that's music, yoga, meditation, journaling, or something else.

### What If No One Believes Me?

To an outsider, stalking can sometimes look like a partner who's just persistent—they send nice gifts, sweet card or elaborate flower arrangements; they show up at your workplace unexpectedly to surprise you. Certainly, movies have led us to believe that someone who doesn't give up on their love interest is a "hopeless romantic." Unfortunately, if these efforts are unwanted and the person making these efforts has been told to stop but continues anyway, this person is going to fall into the stalker category.

If you're a survivor of stalking, it's not your fault. Continue to remind yourself that it's not in your head—if your gut feeling says something is off or you're not safe, it's important to listen. Keep speaking up, logging each incident and reporting the stalker. If the stalker is a former partner, reach out to an advocate at your local domestic violence program who can be a

nonjudgmental sounding board for what you're going through. Creating both a physical safety plan and an emotional safety plan will help you feel more prepared for future incidents. Plan out who you can turn to and where you can go if you feel like you're not safe at home. Talk with children who live in your home about what steps they should take if they see the stalker or feel unsafe at any time.
