# TRUST IN GOD'S WISDOM

At various times in my life the Gospel today has been difficult to listen to and to reflect on. I am sure it may be difficult for others as well. The part of the Gospel where Jesus tells us that if we are angry with our brothers and do not reconcile, we will be liable for judgement has worried me. I am sure many of us can relate. My family and I do not always get along. Situations that caused friction and division over the years are not easily forgotten. Olive branches may be extended and accepted but also ignored many times. There's anger that has led to the current state we find ourselves in. However, as time has elapsed anger has turned more into sadness because there has not been or probably will not be any true reconciliation. Looking at our relationships or lack of relationships, I have come to accept that each of us has made mistakes and each of us shares blame. This is why this Gospel has often been a challenge for me.

Reflecting more closely on the entire Gospel passage and not just this part of the Gospel, we understand that Jesus is continuing the Sermon on the Mount and reviewing the expectations of how to follow the commandments. The key that Jesus is teaching us is not just the laws of the commandments, but to understand the intent of our actions, and the movement of our hearts. Jesus reminds us in this passage about exactly how to follow and live and teach the commandments.

When I work with students in class or in situations of discipline, I always remind and challenge them to make wise, correct, and polite decisions, and to be kindhearted to everyone they meet each day. These actions are a way for them to learn what it means to put their trust in God and to try to emulate what Jesus has taught us

about loving and serving one another; following the commandments. Trusting in God gives us the wisdom

When we follow the commandments, we are not just following rules, we are choosing to put trust in God's wisdom. This is an everyday choice we must make; to trust in God and accept God's will. Jesus helps us to grow in our faith by serving as a perfect example of how to live a life of faith and service and acceptance of God's will. We are called to trust in God more deeply so that we can live as Jesus did. Each of the readings today offer this theme of knowing that the wisdom of following God's law can bring us peace.

In the first reading today, Sirach reminds us that God has given us the power to choose freely. He tells us that the choice to keep the commandments and pursue understanding the Lord's wisdom will save us. By keeping the commandments, Sirach tells us, "If you choose, you can keep the commandments, they will save you, if you trust in God, you too shall live." This helps us to develop a better understanding of free will. The person who chooses the path of doing good does so freely. The same is true of the person who chooses the path of evil. Sirach writes, "Before man are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses will be given him." Near the end of the reading Sirach reminds us that because of our gift of free will, God is not responsible for sin; it comes from us. "No one does he command to act unjustly, to none does he give license to sin."

In the second reading today, Paul is writing to the Corinthians about the wisdom of God. He explains that this wisdom does not belong to any political forces but is something that humans cannot attain on their own. It is bestowed upon those who believe by God. This wisdom Paul tells us had been hidden for ages but is revealed to us through the Holy Spirit. He uses the words of Isaiah that we have heard many times to explain this to the Corinthians, and us, those who believe, "What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him, this God has revealed to us through the Spirit. For the Spirit scrutinizes everything, even the depths of God."

In the Gospel, Jesus continues the Sermon on the Mount which we have heard over the past few weeks. Many say that it is his deliverance of the "new commandments." This Sermon which begins with the Beatitudes is him illustrating his message that he is here to fulfill the laws and the prophets, and they are not new commandments. He says, "Do not think that I have come to abolish law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill." In today's passage he is addressing the commandments involving murder, adultery, divorce, and lying.

Let's look at his explanation of the commandment, "Thou shalt not kill." Jesus is teaching us that we have great responsibility. He tells us there is a deep responsibility to not simply refrain from evil actions but find and correct the causes for evil actions in the first place. This applies not just to this commandment, but to all the commandments and all of what we do in our lives. Jesus is clearly telling us that we must not only drop anger, but take away the deep cause of anger, so that we can live a life of love. To choose to live in Christ tells us to pay close attention to our actions and then also the emotions within us.

Jesus explains the responsibility we have in this way; "Therefore whoever breaks one of the least of the commandments and teaches others to do so will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. But whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called the greatest in the kingdom." Even though this Gospel is a challenge for me, I just keep reminding myself to live out this responsibility, and to trust God and obey the commandments every day. It is time to explore extending those olive branches again.

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Just the other day some of my friends agreed on a new way to approach the new year: Select one word, a kind of mantra for 2023. Ironically, even though I am indecisive to a fault, I had no trouble deciding on mine: "Choose." I often get stuck, whether it's deciding which online clothing purchases to return, what to order on the menu ... and don't get me started on major life decisions. Today's reading from Sirach reminds us of the choice that matters most: If we *choose* to keep the commandments, they will save us. "Before man are life and death, good and evil, whichever he chooses shall be given him." We are well into 2023, but it bears reminding that each day we have an opportunity to choose anew: To follow God's law, fulfilled in the words and example of Jesus. He will show us the way. "If you trust in God, you too shall live."

### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

We've probably all heard the term "quiet quitting" by now. It's a workplace phenomenon where employees do the bare minimum rather than going above and beyond. I thought of that phrase when reading Matthew's Gospel today. How many of us Christians have "quietly quit," doing the minimum required - going to Mass on Sunday, being faithful to our spouse, not resorting to violence when we get angry with someone. Jesus challenges us to go above and beyond the Ten Commandments. You shall not kill, but you should not stay angry either. You shall not commit adultery, but you shall also love your spouse with your whole heart. Today's readings challenge us to rediscover God's law and challenge ourselves to go "above and beyond" in our daily lives.

**PRAY** Pray today's psalm (119): "Blessed are they who follow the law of the Lord!" How might you specifically follow the law of the Lord just a little bit better, or above and beyond, today? Each day?

### Create a genuine love story

No one ever said relationships were easy. Commitments, whether in marriage, religious life, or elsewhere, take spiritual insight to discern, patience to maintain, time to mature, and a whole lot of love to keep the engine moving on the tracks. Today's celebration of World Marriage Day is meant to support the development of a culture of life and love within our most fundamental relationships. As Pope Francis declared in *Amoris Laetitia* (The Joy of Love): "The welfare of the family is decisive for the future of the world and that of the church." Take the journey to joy and love. Work to make each relationship life-giving.

### Make a petition, not a deal

It can be tempting, especially when we're desperate, to try to bargain with God: "If you do this one thing for me, I'll quit a bad habit forever and never miss Mass again." But that's not how our relationship with God works. For starters, Jesus told us not to bargain, but to simply ask for what we need (Matthew 7:7-11). God already knows what we need better than we do but wants us to ask anyway, persistently even—because a willingness to be vulnerable and share intimacy are central to any healthy relationship. For that reason, petitionary prayer isn't always easy. Open up with your longings and offer God your trust, rather than a deal.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 4:1-15, 25; Mark 8:11-13 (335). "Amen, I say to you, no sign will be given to this generation."

### Tuesday, Feb 14, 2023

### Speak the language of love

More than 1,000 years before Vatican II—with its directive to translate the Latin liturgy into the vernacular—two missionary siblings, Cyril and Methodius, got the blessing of their pope to do the same for the Slavic people. In doing so, they created the Cyrillic alphabet. And as Pope John Paul II noted, they impacted not only the "history of the church, but also the civil and the political history of a great part of the European continent. . . . Cyril and Methodius [are] not only the apostles of the Slavic peoples but also the fathers of their culture." On this Valentine's Day, how can you translate love into your vernacular?

### Wednesday, Feb 15, 2023

#### A pioneer priest who broke a color barrier

On this day in 1880, Augustus Tolton departed the United States on a holy mission: to enter a Catholic seminary as an African American. After several years of trying to become a priest stateside and experiencing rejection due to racism, Tolton's friends and allies successfully arranged for his passage to study at the Urban College in Rome, where he was ordained as the world's first openly African-American Catholic priest in 1886. He would return to his home state of Illinois, eventually settling in Chicago where he founded the city's first black parish. He died of heat stroke in 1897 at the young age of 43 and has since been on the path to sainthood. In these times of continuing anti-black discrimination, may we look to his witness for hope and sustenance. Venerable Father Tolton, pray for us!

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 8:6-13, 20-22; Mark 22-26 (337). "My vows to the LORD I will pay in the presence of all his people. Precious in the eyes of the LORD is the death of his faithful ones."

### Thursday, Feb 16, 2023

#### Take the path of Saint Francis

Christian theology has often encouraged human domination over creation. Saint Francis of Assisi had another view, one that has become more prominent in the church as the climate crisis intensifies. Franciscan Sister Rose Dowling expresses one facet of it: "The Earth with which we are so intimate is our primary teacher about who God is and how God wants to relate with us... I see a God who has set into being a creation that continues to grow, evolve, become more conscious, become more complex. I see that as a human I, like the rest of creation, have the potential to grow and become *more* ..." How will you become more conscious of all of creation today?

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 9:1-13; Mark 8:27-33 (338). "Peter said to him in reply, 'You are the Christ.' "

### Friday, Feb 17, 2023

#### To Mary, in times of sorrow

The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order were 13th-century Florentine cloth merchants who banded together in prayer, solace, and community during politically tumultuous times. From the beginning, the Servites dedicated themselves to Mary, the Sorrowful Mother. Today their mission is to "gather in fraternal communion to be with those suffering and sorrowful." The Servites developed the three most common devotions to Our Lady of Sorrows, namely the Scapular of the Seven Dolours of Mary, the Novena to Our Sorrowful Mother, and the Rosary of the Seven Sorrows. In the closing prayer of the Rosary chaplet, we say, "Pray for us, O most sorrowful Virgin. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ." That is certainly a prayer to remember as we face each day's trials.

They had to come down the mountain. There was more that needed to be done, people who needed to be served. In his 1967 encyclical, *Populorum Progressio* (On the Development of Peoples), Pope Paul VI wrote, "Genuine progress . . . consists in an economic order designed for the welfare of the human person, where the daily bread that each [one] receives reflects the glow of love and the helping hand of God." Pray that we become enamored by justice and help transfigure the world in Jesus' image!

# Will Domestic Abuse Happen Again?

### How to tell if your partner has really changed or if they're likely to abuse again - Part I

Perhaps your partner hit you when they were drunk and has since apologized, promising it will never happen again. Or maybe you found out that your partner used to stalk their ex but swears they've changed. Is there any way to tell if abusive behaviors will repeat themselves?

The unfortunate truth is that domestic abuse doesn't tend to be an isolated incident. It's exceedingly rare that someone in a healthy relationship would hit their partner out of the blue and then never do it again, or use controlling behaviors on one partner but not the next. Abuse is a choice people make in order to wield power and control over another individual, and oftentimes this starts with nonphysical abuse, such as **coercion**, intimidation and **emotional abuse**, before escalating to violence. The difference between abuse and "just a bad argument" with **a healthy partner** is that abusers repeat their abusive behaviors again in the next fight, often escalating them, and typically don't accept blame or show remorse.

**Statistics** around arrests also tend to back this up. While just 10 to 18 percent of those arrested for domestic violence are arrested again within six months, 15 to 30 percent face a second arrest within 28 months, and up to 60 percent are rearrested within 10 years. And it's pretty safe to say these numbers only tell part of the story, considering most domestic violence is never reported to law enforcement.

### Can Abusers Change?

All that said, it is possible for some abusers to change. But it doesn't happen overnight, and it takes a lot of work—and counseling—to do it.

"In order to change, the abuser has to consciously choose to change and take responsibility for being abusive, permanently," says Gretchen Shaw, National Coalition Against Domestic Violence associate director.

In other words, someone who hits you and then comes back a week later and says they'll never do it again is probably not telling the truth. It's best to move on from someone who's abused you or a previous partner. However, if you truly think a person might have changed but want to know for sure, here are some indicators that change is possible:

He or she has done more than counseling.

Domestic violence is not something that can be controlled or resolved through therapy because abuse is a choice, not a mental illness. Even though abusers can have mental health issues or a previous history of abuse in their past, which therapy can help them work through, their choice to continue a pattern of abuse toward their partner is something they must be held accountable for. Many abusers will use therapy as another way to manipulate the partners to stay, promising there is change coming because they're "getting help." **Couples counseling is not recommended** for those in relationships with abusers either because of the high likelihood the abuser will manipulate these sessions for their benefit.
