

Today's Gospel story tells the story of the encounter a Samaritan woman has with

Jesus at Jacob's Well. It is a great story that deals with everything from the Samaritan/Jewish rift that existed 2000 years ago to finding truth unexpectedly and the result of spiritual growth in one's faith. This is another of those great shock value stories in the Bible. Here the woman who encounters Our Lord just shows contempt and indignation towards Jesus. She knows He's a Jew; she knows of the Jewish disdain for her people and how they choose to worship God, she also knows that the Jews were never to speak to Samaritans. This intrigues her and the more and more that she gets to conversing with Jesus, she changes her tune. So does Jesus. He is very abrupt with her when He asks the favor of the initial drink. But later the compassionate side, His Sacred Heart, which is unbounded in love for the lost and forsaken, takes charge. Jesus decides to take a break from the journey to Jerusalem to the end we all know which is Calvary. He makes time for this woman who, and here is the shocking detail, has not been the model wife having had

5 husbands and the one she was with now isn't her husband. The unexpected truth comes out. Jesus knows He needed to play that card with her to begin her conversion and the conversion of the people of her town. The Samaritan townpeople also intrigued by initial shocking story come to believe in Christ and tell the woman so. What about the apostles during all this? Does the phrase "out to lunch" sound appropriate? They have been living with Jesus for 3 years now,



listening to Him teach, and witnessing every kind of miracle from the multiplication of loaves and fishes to the raising of Jarius' daughter from the dead. And they still question why he is talking to her and if he has had food. Why not? Jesus always was going beyond the law of the Jewish religion of His time. They still have a hard time understanding what He is all about and His mission so He then spells it out, but

I can see Him shaking His head. But just as He is loving to that woman



at the well so is He with the motley group of apostles He chose to take on the world after His Resurrection. He knows the potential for a faith-filled life as long as the person is willing to take it on and the potential for greatness once that person begins to act on the faith they have. So He explains, "I tell you, look up and see the fields ripe for the harvest. The reaper is already receiving payment and gathering crops for eternal life, so that the sower and reaper can rejoice together."

I often wonder what happened to those Samaritans turned "Christians" or "believers in the Christ". Did they become one of the first Christian communities? Is this one of the groups that St. Paul would later engage with as he began his evangelization outside of Jerusalem. They might be the blood ancestors of the Christians who still live outside of Jerusalem in the Holy Land today. No matter if they are or are not the blood ancestors, they still possess the truth of the Gospel that the ancestors came to believe in. And it gives them the courage they need as the minority in a land where Jews and Moslems outnumber them greatly. And they wouldn't have it any other way for they are at peace with God.

How appropriate today's Gospel is to coincide with our focus for the Third Week of Lent in regards to our Almgiving Project supporting the missions of the Catholic Extension Society. What group today needs to have that encounter with Jesus more than ever, that life-changing, make you want to stop and think about your future, encounter with God?? Our young people!!

So that is why I am writing this Sunday Sharing to highlight a place where encountering Jesus in a different way can be that stop and think moment for young people: **Legendary Lodge in Seeley Lake, Montana.** The Catholic Extension Society is assisting Legendary Lodge with their youth ministry camps to continue to provide those


encounters with Jesus that can result in a more faith-filled life, one more engaged in service to their local Church, one that may lead to a vocation to become a religious sister or diocesan priest. As Christ says in the Gospel, "the harvest is ripe,...one sows and another reaps." Parents have planted the seed of faith, now for teens getting ready to be confirmed and older teens becoming young adults, Legendary Lodge provides that "encounter at Jacob's Well with Christ". Through their program at camp they provide the setting where God surrounds them with His beauty of the mountains and forests of Montana so they can come to enjoy building friendships with not only their peers but with Christ as well. The challenge presented is to live out a Christian life "on the other side of the lake" back in their home parishes and school communities. Legendary Lodge camps are filled with adventure, friendship and plenty of fun. Campers are encouraged in Discipleship, to learn about their Faith and encounter God's profound love.

For the counselors and leaders at Legendary Lodge, it's their goal that this experience does not leave when camp is over. They work closely with the Bishop Austin Vetter of Helena, area priests, youth ministers and parents to ensure the themes and ideas discussed are built upon throughout the year. Based on the impactful camp experience, parishes are seeing their youth continue church involvement year-round. The Diocese of Helena's youth ministry program is truly connecting the dots between small, rural faith communities and the universal Church. ... Oliver's Success Story

One example comes from the Catholic Extension blog which recounts the story of Oliver, a camp counselor at Legendary Lodge. While the sun set behind the mountains, a campfire was carefully lit by the water's edge. Bleachers circled the fire pit and were quickly filled with campers excitedly laughing and talking amongst themselves. Each night, a camp counselor tells an interesting story or a testimony about their personal faith. After a few ice-breaking campfire songs, we learned it was Oliver's night to share his faith testimony, and everyone hushed to listen.

Oliver explained his personal journey and ultimate decision to attend seminary school in the fall at St. John Vianney Theological Seminary. He said that he felt a natural calling to the priesthood during his youth, but "didn't have friends interested in discussing their faith," and he put those thoughts





on shelf. When Oliver attended a small Catholic college in Helena, he became immersed in campus ministry, and found many other youths interested and engaged in their Catholic faith. During this time, Oliver was pursuing a career path in medicine; he also hoped to have a family some day. Throughout this time, he knew he was still interested in the priesthood, but "I was always waiting for my big sign," he said.

Then, while visiting the Vatican with classmates from college, it happened. While his close friends knelt down and prayed at St. Peter's tomb, Oliver stood quietly in the back and felt a great love open from deep within him. "At that moment, I was overwhelmed with my love for the Eucharist," he explained through tears. "It still chokes me up today—I'm getting used to being this emotional when I speak about it." Oliver's overwhelming experience led him to contact Fr. Marc Lenneman, a trusted priest and mentor with whom he spoke with often. Fr. Marc, who was present at the fire that night, knew Oliver from his college campus ministry and is also the Chaplain at Legendary Lodge. After prayer and reflection, Oliver fully realized and "opened himself up" to his true calling, the priesthood. It was not an easy process, but he now feels God's plan has been fully revealed to him.

After Oliver's heartfelt story, many others opened up around that very fire and spoke about their hopes, dreams, fears and faith. Humorous stories and laugher intertwined with the deeply personal and profound.

I want to think that this story of the campfire sharing is similar to what happened in that Samaritan town long ago. So just as in the Gospel, the unexpected truth comes forth, the stories are told and recounted, Jesus is found to be the Christ, and the future is brighter.



Moths represent transformation, resurrection, wisdom, concealment, determination, vulnerability, and weakness. In symbolizing change, the spiritual meaning of a moth is accepting that change instead of hiding from it, having faith that you will eventually see the light.



SEVEN CHURCHES BUS TOUR

Holy Thursday is the feast that marks the end of Lent and the beginning of the Holy Triduum, which also includes Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday. At this Mass of the Lord's Supper Catholics remember the Passover meal, when Jesus instituted the sacrament of the holy Eucharist by sharing bread and wine with his disciples, saying, "Do this in memory of Me."

At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass, the Eucharist is placed on a temporary "altar of repose" away from the sanctuary. It is customary for the faithful to process together to this altar and spend time in quiet prayer and adoration. In the Roman Missal, it states: "The faithful are invited to continue adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for a suitable length of time during the night, according to circumstance."

The Seven Churches Visitation is a tradition that grew out of this time of prayer and adoration. Catholics remember when Jesus asked his disciples to stay and watch with Him while they were in the garden. This tradition of mindful watching is a sort of pilgrimage to various altars of repose, in different churches that correspond to each of the seven places, or "stations," that were made by Jesus between the Last Supper in the Upper Room to His crucifixion on the cross.

Please join us on Holy Thursday beginning at 8:30pm as we begin our 7 church pilgrimage. We will visit Saint Hedwig, Saint Josaphat, Saint Clement, Saint Stanislaus Kostka, Holy Trinity Polish Mission, Saint Hyacinth Basilica and Saint Andrew. Space is limited. 

Third Sunday of Lent

Ex 17:3-7 | Rom 5:1-2, 5-8 | Jn 4:5-42



Even St. Teresa of Calcutta experienced a period of "spiritual dryness." We pray, we go to Mass faithfully, we serve others yet at times God's presence may seem elusive. Like the Israelites, we may ask, "Is the Lord in our midst or not?" As we enter the third Sunday of Lent, today's readings assure us that God remains with us even during those times we may feel spiritually parched. In Exodus, water flows from a rock to satisfy the people. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the Samaritan woman at the well: "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." The woman, a sinner and an outcast, recognizes Jesus as Messiah, and it changes her life. Even when we don't "feel" God's presence, we can rest assured that Jesus stands beside us. He is our redemption and our Hope, and "Hope does not disappoint."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's Gospel, Jesus breaks with custom by talking to a woman - a Samaritan woman, no less. He "sees" her - knowing she has been married five times before and is living with a man not her husband. Yet he chooses to reveal to her his identity as the Messiah and offers her "living water." But it doesn't end there. The woman at the well goes forth and shares her experience with others. Many more came to believe in the Messiah based on her testimony. What an unlikely disciple! We may feel that we, too, are unlikely disciples: We are sinners, we've made mistakes, perhaps we feel we are unworthy to "represent" Jesus to others. But nothing is further from the truth. Jesus invites us not only to partake of the living water but to share it with others so that all may believe.

ACTION Put a note on your mirror or bedside: "Hope does not disappoint." Each morning, remind yourself that Jesus is the source of our hope, and try to think of ways to share this hope with others.

Truth be told

Pontius Pilate famously asked Jesus, "What is truth?" Pilate didn't stick around for the answer (which in itself says a lot), but if he had, he might have heard something like the definition the Catechism of the Catholic Church provides: "Truth as uprightness in human action and speech is called truthfulness, sincerity, or candor. Truth or truthfulness is the virtue which consists in showing oneself true in deeds and truthful in words, and in guarding against duplicity, dissimulation, and hypocrisy." Now we have a sense of what it means to imitate Christ in all things.

On the frontiers of servanthood

When you think of the legendary figures of the Wild West, Billy the Kid, Buffalo Bill, Annie Oakley, Geronimo, and Sitting Bull come to mind. But how about Sister Blandina Segale? Add her to list—because she had encounters with many of those men and women, and her life was also the stuff of lore. Born in 1850, this Italian-American Sister of Charity of Cincinnati traveled alone through the American frontier to serve the poor and sick (including saving the life of a seriously wounded Billy the Kid), to advocate for Native American civil rights, and to fight against lynching (including protecting a contrite murderer from a mob). This Catholic Sisters Week (March 8-14) count Segale, honored by the church with the title servant of God, among the heroic sisters who have your gratitude for spreading the faith.

No room for hate

Fannie Lou Hamer died this day in 1977. But she nearly died in 1963, in a Mississippi jail cell—so badly beaten, as a civil rights advocate, that her cell mate didn't think she'd survive the night. But Hamer asked her to join in singing the hymn "Walk With Me, Lord" and lived to see another day. In fact Hamer lived to testify, on television, before the 1964 Democratic National Convention. A tireless campaigner for women's voting rights, she was also inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame. Follow Hamer's lead in fostering forgiveness: "I feel sorry for anybody that could let hate wrap them up. Ain't no such thing as I can hate anybody and hope to see God's face."

Printing the truth is worth the struggle

On this week in 1827, *Freedom's Journal* began publication as the first African-American newspaper in history. Founded by Protestant minister John Wilk and leading free black men in New York City, the paper would set off a revolution in U.S. media, resulting in similar papers being established nationwide, forming the black press. Daniel Rudd founded the first black Catholic

newspaper in 1885, and the explosion in African-American conversions to Catholicism in the 20th century can be attributed in large part to these newspapers advertising better conditions in the northern United States (where Catholic parishes and schools happened to be plentiful). The black press continues today in many American cities and represents one of the nation's original justice-focused professional institutions. Consider supporting a local—or national—black news outlet today.

Let God carry it

The comedy-drama *The Banshees of Inisherin* features a man gloomy about his eventual death going to Confession over a period of weeks. Each time, the priest asks, "And how is the despair?" implying despair itself might be seen as a sin—rather tough but also tender in the way the priest wants to understand the whole man. The church upholds hope as a virtue and warns against despair because it can leave no room for God's grace. That said, our faith leaders have long shown compassion for the complexities of depression in its many forms. Whatever your emotional state, consider turning today's burdens over to God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 7:23-28; Luke 11:14-23 (240). "But if it is by the finger of God that I drive out demons, then the Kingdom of God has come upon you."

As luck would have it

The Lord expects great things from us: namely, to love God with our whole heart, soul, and mind, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Are humans really capable of such love? Irish writer Oscar Wilde had his doubts: "I sometimes think that God in creating man somewhat overestimated his ability." We human beings do tend to make a mess of things when left to our own devices, but luckily for us, we have a loving God who sent Jesus to show us the way to love, and the Holy Spirit to keep us on the path of love. In honor of Saint Patrick, remember to draw on the Trinity as you continually recalibrate your trajectory toward love.

The fragrance of forgiveness

Cyril, a fourth-century bishop of Jerusalem and a doctor of the church, was instrumental in forming the church's doctrinal understanding of the Holy Spirit. He wrote, "The Spirit comes gently and makes himself known by his fragrance. He is not felt as a burden for God is light . . . The Spirit comes with the tenderness of a true friend to save, to heal, to teach, to counsel, to strengthen and to console." The formula for absolution in the sacrament of Reconciliation identifies the Holy Spirit as sent "for the forgiveness of sins." Celebrate the sacrament at your church this afternoon.

The requirements are as follows:

Every team member has his or her own sleeping bag and mat, pillow, towel, and toiletries so floors, couches, or air mattresses work just fine. They will need access to a bathroom and shower.

The missionaries will need housing on the evenings of 3/24 and 3/25.

Ms. Gemo has housed NET Ministries missionaries in the past. Feel free to reach out to her if you have any questions. They really are low maintenance and easy to house.

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
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
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
