

Our Gospel Story this week is a powerful story about the raising of Lazarus from the dead. We know of Martha, Mary, and Lazarus from other stories in the scriptures, so we know that this family were friends of Jesus.

They send a message to Jesus about Lazarus' serious illness and Jesus answers with the interesting statement the illness was for the glory of God, and it would be so that the Son of God would be glorified through it. We know of course, that these events end with Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead.

These events caused Martha to profess her belief that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. Now

obviously, Jesus knew he was going to raise Lazarus from the dead, so he knew the outcome of these events. But, an interesting thing that happens is when Jesus saw Mary and the others who were with her weeping, the text says, "Jesus wept."

This was such a powerful moment that some realized the depth of Jesus' love for Lazarus. But, others questioned why he had not done more for Lazarus if he loved him and his sisters. Why had he not come sooner and done something to heal him.

In many ways, this is the very thing we experience

and hear in our own lives. We believe God loves us, and we profess our belief in Jesus as the

Son of God. But, in all lives there are times of great difficulty and terrible loss. When these things happen, some people find themselves drawn in closer to God. Their faith in God is strengthened, and they feel more loved by God. However, we are even more likely to hear people question. If God loves us so much, why does he allow us to suffer? If God can do anything why did he create a world, where people (even those who follow him), must suffer?

The problem of evil has no simple answer, and what we offer can leave us feeling less than satisfied. While we believe that if we offer up our sufferings, God can use them to bring blessings to others; this still leaves us enduring difficulty in this life.

Part of what we believe is that God did create a world without suffering that we will share in. He created a world where Human life will be complete. And, we believe that he did invite us to share in that world. We call that, Heaven. Our hope rests in the belief that because Jesus died for our sins, we have the forgiveness that will allow us to share in this glory.

In this life, and in this world, we will still need to endure the incompleteness that is the life we live on earth. Although we cannot completely understand what role pain and suffering have in our life here and our journey to eternal life with God, we trust that God can transform this pain and suffering into some force for good. In the meanwhile, the main "answer" we receive is that simple phrase "And Jesus wept."

It affirms our belief that God walks with us through these troubles. He knows deeply how these terrible events affect us and He is there to support us in these times. In our trust and in our offering, God does transform evil to a force for goodness.

The most powerful sign of this is the cross and the death of Jesus. God takes this terrible evil and transforms it into the very means of our salvation. God takes some of the worse of human life and uses it to heal us and bring us to glory with God in heaven.

Building Faith | Inspiring Hope | Igniting Change

This week of Lent we are praying for the St. Anthony Mission and School in the Zuni Pueblo of New Mexico

St. Benedict parish and school community is partnering with Catholic Extension this Lenten season to support our work throughout the country.



Support St. Anthony Mission and school in the Diocese of Gallup, New Mexico. St. Anthony Mission and school serves the Zuni Pueblo. Father Patrick McGuire is pastor there. Fr. McGuire is a missionary priest from Scotland. St. Anthony Mission was founded in 1920 with the Catholic school being a source of hope and a unifying institution for the region.

With its ponderosa pines, desert and juniper shrubs, the vast landscape around the church is revered by the local people as "Mother Earth." Thirty percent of homes here lack access to

potable water. Fr. McGuire always keeps parish facilities readily open and available so residents could draw water.

The locals come to the mission to fill up their containers and trucks with lifegiving water. One neighbor brings a container on wheels, filling it with his supply of fresh water for an entire week and then pulling it along the road all the way home. Many like him simply would not survive without our mission.

About 70 percent of the population is unemployed with more than a third living in poverty. Fr. McGuire recounted the suffering of a 17-year-old boy, orphaned when COVID-19 took the lives of both of his parents and left several young siblings in his care. The teen struggled to complete his education in a home without internet or electricity. "We do everything we can to bring some measure of relief," said Fr. McGuire. "Wrapping it in the





mantel of God's love made visible through them."

When asked what he likes most about the Zuni people, Fr. McGuire said, "The strength of family, the extended family. That would be the most obvious one. And then the sense of the divine in life."

He sees his ministry as reminiscent of apostolic times, "when witness and word were the means of evangelization. Each in his or her own way with our limited resources are finding some means to facilitate the Holy Spirit's action."


Program Helped Struggling Catholic Schools

Survive the Pandemic

Four Native American Catholic schools remain open through expert guidance offered by a Catholic Extension initiative.

In 2017 four Catholic schools serving Native American students in the Diocese of Gallup began a four-year program to help them improve their long-term strategies, finances and enrollment. The schools could not have known just how essential the program would be when the COVID-19 pandemic arrived.

Catholic Extension offers the program to struggling Catholic schools in Extension dioceses through our Catholic School Sustainability Initiative. The program is operated by Catholic



The schools, all located in New Mexico, operate in some of the poorest areas of the United States, where the unemployment rate is as high as 80 percent. They include Sacred Heart Catholic School in Gallup, St. Anthony School in Zuni, St. Joseph Mission School in San Fidel and St. Teresa of Avila School in Grants.

These institutions offer an excellent education and build spiritual foundations for their pupils, who are mostly Native American students. They also incorporate and celebrate native language and cultural traditions in the curriculum.

Catholic Extension has stood in solidarity with these communities during the chaos and uncertainty of the pandemic, which struck these communities particularly hard. Through the generosity of our donors, Catholic Extension provided aid to parishes and schools to allow them to reach out to families with food, learning packets for students and other essential supplies.

Already struggling before the pandemic, student enrollment at the four Catholic schools plummeted as families on the reservations faced some of the highest rates of COVID-19 infections in the country and an inability to conduct remote learning due to poor internet access.

However, these schools were not left alone in these devastating circumstances. Through the ongoing consultation services provided through the Catholic School Management program, school leaders developed strategies to overcome these significant challenges.



Thanks to the initiative, all four schools have remained financially solvent and returned to pre-pandemic levels of enrollment.

Sister Marsha Moon, RSC, principal of St. Anthony School in Zuni, said, "During this in-depth study of our school, we were able to develop a strategic plan, which not only speaks to now, but also projects into the future. This study has given us tools to use in our future self-studies and our school's growth and development." These schools are not alone in their success. Catholic Extension has helped 64 institutions take part in this transformative program. By supporting these Catholic schools on their path to improved financial, marketing and enrollment strategies, our donors have helped thousands of children in poor regions of the U.S. grow and learn in these outstanding, faith-filled educational environments.



SEVEN CHURCHES BUS TOUR

Holy Thursday is the feast that marks the end of Lent and the beginning of the Holy Triduum, which also includes Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday. At this Mass of the Lord's Supper Catholics remember the Passover meal, when Jesus instituted the sacrament of the holy Eucharist by sharing bread and wine with his disciples, saying, "Do this in memory of Me."

At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass, the Eucharist is placed on a temporary "altar of repose" away from the sanctuary. It is customary for the faithful to process together to this altar and spend time in quiet prayer and adoration. In the Roman Missal, it states: "The faithful are invited to continue adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for a suitable length of time during the night, according to circumstance."

The Seven Churches Visitation is a tradition that grew out of this time of prayer and adoration. Catholics remember when Jesus asked his disciples to stay and watch with Him while they were in the garden. This tradition of mindful watching is a sort of pilgrimage to various altars of repose, in different churches that correspond to each of the seven places, or "stations," that were made by Jesus between the Last Supper in the Upper Room to His crucifixion on the cross.

Please join us on Holy Thursday beginning at 8:30pm as we begin our 7 church pilgrimage. We will visit Saint Hedwig, Saint Josaphat, Saint Clement, Saint Stanislaus Kostka, Holy Trinity Polish Mission, Saint Hyacinth Basilica and Saint Andrew. Space is limited. Fifth Sunday of Lent

Ez 37:12-14 | Rom 8:8-11 | Jn 11:1-45




In today's Gospel, we see so clearly the fully human nature of Jesus even in the midst of him revealing his divine nature in raising Lazarus from the dead. On hearing that his friend Lazarus had died, Jesus "wept," and he became "perturbed and deeply troubled." We see his love for Martha and Mary, and the freedom he gives them to love him fully in return, and to expect things of him. Each of them confronts Jesus, exasperated: Had you come earlier, our brother would not have died! Yet in the same breath, they express their faith that Jesus is the resurrection and the life. As we continue our Lenten journey, we can rest assured that Jesus is never far from us and that he understands our human longings, struggles and pain. Like Martha and Mary, we can place our faith in Jesus here, now and for eternity.

GO EVANGELIZE PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The raising of Lazarus foreshadows Christ's death and resurrection and reminds us of God's enduring power over death. That can, at times, seem a small comfort as we confront our own mortality or mourn the loss of those dear to us. Yet, just as Jesus showed his love for Lazarus, Martha and Mary, we, too, can extend our love and support for others in their grief. We can show our love through our simple presence, a thoughtful card or an offer to pray for the deceased person and their family. In these ways, we can strengthen our own faith and that of others. As we hear in today's Gospel, "Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him."

ACTION As we grow closer to Holy Week, now is a good time to participate in the sacrament of reconciliation. Has it been a while? The U.S. Bishops provide a helpful guide on their website: usccb.org.

Hints of resurrection

While the Hebrew scripture written before Jesus lived doesn't explicitly speak of resurrection in the same way it is spoken of after Jesus is raised from the dead, there are certainly rumors and whispers. Perhaps the most explicit references are in chapter 37 of Ezekiel, where God, working through the prophet, raises a valley of dry bones to new life and promises to restore them to the promised land after their captivity in Babylon centuries before Christ. Saint Jerome called the vision of the valley of bones a "simile" of the Resurrection to come. There's hope for these old bones yet!

A profile in courage

In the last week of Women's History Month, here's another Catholic woman who made history: Servant of God Catherine de Hueck Doherty (1896-1985). Born wealthy in Russia, she escaped the Russian Revolution and fled to Canada. During the Great Depression, she founded Friendship House, a Catholic outreach movement to serve the poor and promote interracial friendship—a movement that started in Toronto and spread to Harlem, Chicago, Washington D.C., and Portland, Oregon. As a nation and a world community, we face trials comparable to the ones Doherty faced. She responded with courage, generosity, love, and gospel witness. Let us do the same!

'Tis a gift to be simple

Happy birthday to Saint John Neumann today—nicknamed the "little bishop" not only for his stature but for the humility that came from his Redemptorist vow of poverty, which he honored even after becoming bishop of Philadelphia. Neumann's simplicity invites rich reflection for Lent. "Our great mistake is that we allow ourselves to be deceived by the spirit of worldly shrewdness, the desire for fame, and the love of comfort," he wrote to a fellow priest. "The principles of faith fade out of our hearts in proportion as we allow the principles of the world to come in." Simplify your life to make more room for what feeds your faith.

Redemption is at hand

Though they, along with other ancient societies, engaged in some forms of household slavery, Jews as a general rule frowned upon the institution. Slaves who were not Jewish were to be offered conversion to Judaism and if they became Jews, immediately freed. Jews were also required to redeem Jewish slaves from non-Jewish owners. Memory of their own captivity in Egypt and Babylonia loomed large, and they resented Jesus promising to free them. But when Jesus spoke of the truth setting Jews free, he was talking about another kind of enslavement, the kind we all fall

into through unskillful actions, behaviors, habits, compulsions. Look honestly at what might be restricting your inner freedom and ask Jesus to redeem you.

Help your unbelief

Can a believer doubt? It can be a relief to learn that a whole school of thought among Catholic theologians asserts that doubt, while seemingly corrosive, can actually bolster faith in the end. Doubt can lead to exploration, which often leads to better understanding, greater clarity, or sometimes simply a willingness to not know, to live without all questions fully answered, leaning into religious practice with an open heart. Most would call that an adult faith. What questions nag at you? Doubt, dig, and remain open to God.

A well-traveled pilgrim helped shape Holy Week

Holy Week begins tomorrow. It's in the description of Jesus' last week—immediately ahead of his death and Resurrection—that all four gospels resemble each other the most. The church's liturgical celebration of Holy Week, however, was a late development. Originally, Christians had only a single *Pascha* liturgy to observe Jesus' suffering, death, and Resurrection. Specific Holy Week liturgies for Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, and Good Friday grew from individual shrines in Jerusalem where each event occurred. Thanks to a detailed travel journal, written in 383 by a remarkable woman pilgrim to the Holy Land named Egeria, these liturgies began to take shape. As Holy Week begins, let's not only honor the women at the empty tomb but the woman who helped define Holy Week.



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
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
