

Today being Divine Mercy Sunday, I have the great privilege to share some thoughts regarding the Easter Season, and meaning behind the devotion that is represented in the Divine Mercy image of Our Risen Lord Jesus. The painting in this Sunday sharing by expressionist artist, Stephen Watley, titled "Divine Mercy For Humanity & The World. 2020" shows a loving Christ with the Western and Eastern Hemisphere of our world on His shoulders. With arms outstretched it looks like a big heart. And it takes a big heart to be truly merciful and compassionate, and that is so the case with the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Easter came with all the joy and promise as always to our broken world, from the far-off Ukrainian conflict to the civil strife in Syria, and on the African continent to our own country and city where mass shootings have become very common place you would think it was the roaring 1920's in Chicago and not 2023. That being said, the Easter Season call us to have hope and faith in the goodness of humanity that mankind can figure it out if it just would promote more of what today's feast day is all about: Divine Mercy.

The whole Divine Mercy Devotion or Movement is not even 100 years old but has become quite popular around the world mainly due to our Polish brethen who find great fortitude and peace through its promotion and practice. The entire devotion is a reminder that the Risen Lord provides both His love and mercy to us as we journey through both the joys and difficulties in life. The challenge that Christ puts to us is to be that to the world. But it is easier to not promote love and mercy, as selfishness, violence, hatred, and revenge seem to rule the day from our politicians down to young people desperate for purpose in life, in despair, and victims of poverty and unemployment. What the world needs now is mercy and forgiveness. In the Gospel of St. Matthew story of the person presenting an offering, Our Lord reminds us all that if you are not reconciled with your



brother that must come first before making an offering at the altar. Promoting reconciliation is essential to solving the world's problems. At some point the Ukrainian and

Russian people are going to have to reconcile over the nightmare that has been unleashed over the last year. People have to stand up to

evil in their midst. In the end, truth, mercy and love will win out. That is the hope of Easter. But it will take many more Easters to pass before it happens. But it takes faith too. Faith in the goodness of mankind, faith in the grace provided by Divine Providence, faith that eventually will need "to move mountains". So unlike St. Thomas, we need to not doubt, to not be discouraged and depressed, to not feel that the world is coming to an end. As in the case of the Apostles after the Resurrection, Christ comes to them and says "Peace". This is the "product" of mercy, trust, and faith. Peace comes to our homes, our neighborhood, our world when those three coincide. We need to be the channel of that peace that St. Francis of Assisi composed in his prayer, "where there is hatred, love.

An enormous amount of love has been shown for one of the important ways this parish ministers to its people by providing quality Catholic education in our parish school. When you read this either on Saturday, the night of the Gala event or after it on Sunday morning, An Evening under the Big Top, is sure to be one for the record books. The outpouring of love by our generous sponsors came in at a record high, over \$115,000. By underwriting the cost of the Gala, which like so many other things has gone through the roof, more of the funds raised for our school's operating budget can be realized through live and silent auctions, ticket admission sales, school projects, and after parties. Our Fund-A-Need for Tuition Scholarships is also sure to be a hit. The love for our school translated into over 220 silent auction packages created from 357 items donated, along with 150 bottles of wine and bourbon. Through everyone efforts, the Gala keeps getting better and better. We are grateful for the leadership, sacrifice, and so much hard work put in by our committee, but especially by our Gala co-chairs, Amy Cupples, Kat Neenan, and Becky Schick. Leading by example is always the way to go. May we apply their example of self-sacrifice, dedication, and love, to how we respond to the challenge of Easter. Can we spread the message of God's infinite mercy? We have 50 days of the Easter Season to begin. My prayer is for your success.

Sunday of Divine Mercy

Acts 2:42-47 | 1 Pt 1:3-9 | Jn 20:19-31

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"I'll believe it when I see it." We've all said this at some point, usually in response to hearing about someone unreliable doing something out of character. St. Thomas had the same reaction in today's Gospel when he wasn't there when the other disciples saw Christ for the first time since he rose from his tomb - "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Although Jesus helped Thomas with his unbelief, he blesses those who have not seen, but believe. Have any of us seen the nail marks in Christ's hands and feet, or the wound in his side? Do we see Christ's body and blood on the altar, or do we see only the gifts of bread and wine? Christ comes to us in ways we can understand initially - parables, bread and wine, the face of people we meet throughout our daily lives - but our faith in what we have not seen, in the great mystery of our salvation, is what makes us Christian.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In today's first reading, we hear reports of the lives of the first disciples soon after Pentecost: communal living, breaking bread together, prayer, selling of their property and possessions and redistributing among themselves according to individual needs. To our ears today, this idyllic community living seems almost incredible. Yet these first disciples were infused with the Holy Spirit, who enabled them to proclaim the Gospel and think of others before themselves. As Christ's disciples today, how are we behaving toward one another? If we truly are among those who have not seen and yet believe, let's act in full confidence. As we heard in the second reading, our faith is "more precious than gold that is perishable even though tested by fire." We certainly aren't perfect, and our faith at times can be sorely tested, and yet this is our call: to share this faith by doing good works in Christ's name to make disciples and build the kingdom of God.

INVITATION People often see Christ through the words and actions of others. This week, actively seek out opportunities to be the hands of Christ. What opportunities does your community have to practice corporal works of mercy?

Sunday, Apr 16, 2023

Put disappointments behind

Learn a lesson from the experience of the apostle we've come to know as "doubting Thomas." Insisting that our expectations be met is often the path to disillusionment and heartbreak. The way to peace is another route entirely. As Saint John Chrysostom taught, "So you want peace of heart? Then do not seek health, nor wealth, nor fame, nor power, nor luxury. Seek wisdom in God's sight, stick to the virtues, and nothing will be able to make you sad." Start by cultivating the seven big virtues: faith, hope, love, prudence, temperance, courage, and justice. And leave disappointment in the rearview mirror.

Reborn and renewed

Are Catholics "born again"? Yes, when we are baptized. In Baptism, we die with Christ, in that all sins are purified, and are reborn as children of God. Once done, it need not and cannot be repeated because by Baptism we are incorporated into Christ, configured to Christ, and sealed forever with the "indelible spiritual mark" of belonging to Christ. Catholics can, however, renew baptismal vows—and often do at Mass, especially during the Easter season, including the Easter Vigil Mass. Cherish this opportunity to restate your promises, profess your faith, and strengthen your commitment to Christ and church once again.

From the Book of Exodus to the Book of Acts, biblical literature is filled with stories of God delivering people from bondage to freedom, from darkness to light. And, as the church instructs in its 1984 document on liberation theology, the "most radical form of slavery is slavery to sin." Reflect on God's activity in your own life, especially during times that you were stuck or caught in a

destructive pattern. God created us free and longs to see us free. Whatever fetters might have you tied down or wrestling in the dark at the moment, know that you can turn to God for release.

Liberation is what God loves to bring!

How do you experience God's overflowing generosity? And how are you paying it forward?
