This weekend we celebrate Palm Sunday. With this celebration we enter the end of Lent. It is hard to believe that we are already at the end of the Lenten season. It feels like we just began this journey and today we enter the final few days of this Lent. I hope that for each of us, our journey through this Lent has helped us grow more fully into the person we know that God created us to be. On Monday through Thursday Morning, we wrap up Lent. So, whatever we wanted to focus this season on, it is time to increase our efforts to use these last days of Lent most creatively and

Last Supper and the Gift of the Eucharist. During The Last Supper, we remember how the Lord focused a life with God on the way of service and love to others. We do this by reenacting Jesus washing of the feet of his disciples. We call this part of the service The Mandatum. It is our mandate, our mission to love each other by the way we treat and help each other, especially the neediest in our midst.

On Friday evening we continue the celebration with the remembrance of the suffering and death of Our Lord. We recall the Passion and death, and then take time to venerate the Cross, because it is the most powerful sign we have of



productively. No matter how well or poorly we have used these past weeks, we still have this time to use the season to grow personally. This is important because we are about to enter the Holiest time of our Liturgical year. We call these three days, (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday): The Triduum.

Regardless of how busy your life has been. Even if you have not been able to get to Mass as often as you would like. Despite the fact that you might not have been able to pray as often as you would have intended. I would encourage you to focus these three Holy Days on your relationship with God.

The Triduum is one long service broken into three parts, celebrated over three days. The main service we celebrate each evening at 7 p.m. On Thursday evening we recall The

God's love for us and service to all. In venerating the cross we also hope to rededicate ourselves to a way of life like Christ. We continue by receiving the Eucharist for strength for our journey. And then we end the service by heading home to rest and continue the celebration on Holy Saturday. Notice that there is no "Mass" celebrated on Good Friday. This is because we are in the middle of our ongoing three-day service. The service of Friday doesn't actually have a beginning or end since it is the middle of the whole Triduum celebration.

Finally on Saturday, we bring the service to its completion with the great celebration of the Easter FOLLOW US ON Vigil. This is a multi-part service. It begins with the service of the new



the light of God who came into our world, and that we as Christians (other Christs) are to be torches to carry His light to the whole world. We then focus on the scripture story of salvation history. Renewing our Baptismal commitment and our intentions to live as Christ for the world, we pray for ourselves and others in the world, and then once again receive the Eucharist to strengthen us for the journey. Finally, we bring the celebration to a close, with a dismissal that ends with a loud and joyful, Alleluia! And off we go to live this new way of life.

Over these three days we will offer several other prayer opportunities. Each morning we start with morning prayer at 8:30 a.m. Notice that this will not be Mass since we are in the middle of the three-day service. On Thursday evening following our celebration, we recall that Jesus spent the night in jail, and we visit our Lord. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will continue until Midnight. And we offer the visitation of the 7 Churches. To participate in that, please call the rectory. On Friday we will also pray the Stations of the Cross, and take time in prayer at 3 p.m. which is the traditional time of the Death of our Lord. Saturday allows time for prayer in church, Confessions if anyone would like to avail themselves of a final opportunity for Reconciliation before Easter, and the Blessing of Baskets, which is the traditional blessing of the first foods of Easter.

You will find the full schedule of all our services in the Bulletin, and on our website. Or you can call us at the rectory. I pray that this next week will be one that is spiritually refreshing for everyone in our parish family.



SEVEN CHURCHES BUS TOUR

Holy Thursday is the feast that marks the end of Lent and the beginning of the Holy Triduum, which also includes Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday. At this Mass of the Lord's Supper Catholics remember the Passover meal, when Jesus instituted the sacrament of the holy Eucharist by sharing bread and wine with his disciples, saying, *"Do this in memory of Me."*

At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass, the Eucharist is placed on a temporary "altar of repose" away from the sanctuary. It is customary for the faithful to process together to this altar and spend time in quiet prayer and adoration. In the Roman Missal, it states: "The faithful are invited to continue adoration before the Blessed Sacrament for a suitable length of time during the night, according to circumstance."

The Seven Churches Visitation is a tradition that grew out of this time of prayer and adoration. Catholics remember when Jesus asked his disciples to stay and watch with Him while they were in the garden. This tradition of mindful watching is a sort of pilgrimage to various altars of repose, in different churches that correspond to each of the seven places, or *"stations,"* that were made by Jesus between the Last Supper in the Upper Room to His crucifixion on the cross.

Please join us on Holy Thursday beginning at 8:30pm as we begin our 7 church pilgrimage. We will visit Saint Hedwig, Saint Josaphat, Saint Clement, Saint Stanislaus Kostka, Holy Trinity Polish Mission, Saint Hyacinth Basilica and Saint Andrew. Space is limited. Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Is 50:4-7 | Phil 2:6-11 | Mt 26:14-27:66

GROW AS A DISCIPLE PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As we begin Holy Week, we hear Matthew's account of the Passion. We see Jesus' humanity as he experiences *sorrow and distress* in the hours before his death. Three times, he asks the Father to "let this cup pass from me, yet, not as I will, but as you will." In our own human experience, I am guessing many of us have asked the Father to "let this cup pass" – for in addition to life's joys, we will all experience setbacks, struggles, and suffering. By example, Jesus shows us that we can turn to our Father, trusting in his will for us. Let this be a reminder in this holiest of weeks that we can bring our suffering and our doubts to the Father, knowing that the joy of Easter will come.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The final words of today's Gospel [shorter version] are those of the centurion and the men keeping watch over Jesus: "Truly this was the Son of God!" Let us keep in mind this central proclamation of our faith while attending Triduum services this week. On Holy Thursday, we remember the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood, celebrating Christ's outpouring of love for us. On Good Friday we venerate the cross as we solemnly recall the passion and death of Jesus. And of course at the Easter Vigil and on Easter Sunday, we celebrate the story of our salvation, culminating in Jesus' resurrection. As Christians, we know that the cross will give way to the empty tomb and the promise of new life in Christ. Let our voices be strong this week as we echo the centurion's words above, and may Jesus' name be praised forever!

PRAY Praying the Stations of the Cross allows us to walk with Jesus through his passion and death. Make that journey with Jesus this week.

Sunday, Apr 09, 2023

From hole to whole

Accounts vary. Sometimes Easter dawns with helpful instructionbearing angels and a palpable earthshaking. In other narratives it's almost a stealthy affair: a yawning open tomb, the shroud deserted, its meaning unclear. So too we experience the Easters of our lives in a variety of ways: fervent or undecided, joyful or indifferent or possibly even sorrowing. The empty tomb is an invitation to faith, an absence that can be filled any number of ways. We pray for each other this day, that what is empty in any of us may be filled with hope and trust.

SOLEMNITY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD (EASTER SUNDAY)

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 10:34a, 37-43; Colossians 3:1-4 or 1 Corinthians 5:6b-8; Victimae Paschali Laudes; John 20:1-9 or Matthew 28:1-10 (42, 41) or, at an afternoon or evening Mass, Luke 24:13-35 (46). "There was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven . . . rolled back the stone, and sat upon it."

Monday, Apr 10, 2023

God brings all things to completion

Who doesn't sometimes get impatient with God's plan for them? Consider that the waiting can not only be useful but also beautiful. "Trust in the slow work of God," wrote Pierre Teilhard de Chardin (who died on this day in 1955). He would know—this French Jesuit priest was forced to leave his teaching post and withdraw controversial statements in 1925 and was further condemned by the church posthumously in 1962. Decades later, leading cardinals started to see his ideas differently—favorably—and so did Popes Benedict XVI and Francis. "It is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability," Chardin wrote—so, like him, accept "feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."

MONDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:14, 22-33; Matthew 28:8-15 (261). "And behold, Jesus met them on their way and greeted them."

Tuesday, Apr 11, 2023

Wage peace

One of the most significant pillars of Catholic social teaching turns 60 today: *Pacem in terris*—in English, "Peace on Earth"—the encyclical written by Pope John XXIII to address the menace of nuclear war and the need to uphold international human rights, including racial equality and women's rights. Significantly, it stands as the first encyclical addressed to both Catholics and non-Catholics alike, drawing worldwide admiration for the church's willingness to confront the social and economic costs of the Cold War. "The social progress, order, security, and peace of each country are necessarily connected with the social progress, order, security, and peace of all other countries," he wrote. Let peace begin with you today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 2:36-41; John 20:11-18 (262). "Mary went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord,' and then reported what he had told her."

Wednesday, Apr 12, 2023

Leave the battlefield behind

Most people know that the Civil War, which began on this day in 1861, was largely an unjust war fought in defense of slavery in the Southern United States (then, for a time, the Confederate States of America). What many do not know is that the first skirmish of the war, the Battle of Fort Sumter in Charleston, South Carolina, was led in part by a Catholic, Confederate Brigadier General P. G. T. Beauregard, a Creole Catholic born and raised on a plantation in Louisiana. After the failures of the Confederacy in the war, Beauregard returned to civilian life in his home region, advocating for black civil rights (including voting), societal unity, and also became an admirer of Abraham Lincoln. May we model repentance in the face of our sins and work always for the common bonds of humanity.

WEDNESDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 3:1-10; Luke 24:13-35 (263). "While he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened."

Thursday, Apr 13, 2023

Accountability matters

When the risen Christ appears to his dumbfounded disciples, he reminds them "that repentance for the forgiveness of sins would be preached in his name." Even the church itself must repent sometimes. The Catholic Native Boarding School Accountability and Healing Project is such an undertaking. Few expect rapid change, but this group of religious, church officials, and laypeople have named a "sin" the church's role in the federal efforts to dismantle Native American culture through boarding schools. That's a start. Learn more on this topic so you can be part of the healing.

Time for breakfast

Comedian Steven Wright may have been on to something when he quipped: "I went to a restaurant that serves 'breakfast at any time,' so I ordered French toast during the Renaissance." For Christians, who wouldn't choose a morning meal prepared by Jesus on the banks of the Sea of Tiberias? In one of the most memorable stories in the Gospel of John, the disciples are treated to just such an amazing repast. The risen Christ's tender care to ensure that the disciples have a good breakfast is both achingly sweet and altogether practical. He knew that to continue his mission, the disciple would need not only the warmth of his love but the strength and focus a hearty breakfast provides. Take care of your physical and spiritual health so that, you too, may be prepared to carry on Christ's loving mission each day.

More than mere appearances

It turns out that Jesus appeared in different forms after his Resurrection. In John's gospel Mary of Magdala, arguably one of the Lord's closest friends, thought he was the gardener. In Luke's gospel two disciples invite him to their house for dinner and haven't a clue who he is. In today's gospel from Mark, we read that "he appeared in another form." Makes you wonder whether it might still be going on. Jesus did say that we engage him in the least of others. In what form will the risen Christ appear to you today?

SATURDAY WITHIN THE OCTAVE OF EASTER TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 4:13-21; Mark 16:9-15 (266). *"After this he appeared in another form."*






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SBPS VISITS THE CHALLENGER LEARNING CENTER

Human Concerns

What Is Elder Abuse?

A comprehensive guide to understanding domestic violence as seen in the elderly

Hundreds of thousands of people 65 and older are victims of elder

abuse each year. At least one in 10 older adults living at home are abused, neglected or exploited every year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), but incidence rates are likely much higher, considering elder abuse often goes unreported to adult protective services organizations.

Types of Elder Abuse

The National Institute on Aging (NIA) defines six types of elder abuse:

- Physical abuse: Inflicting pain or injury through such actions as slapping, hitting, bruising or restraining. Physical abuse can also be inflicted through medication tampering—giving too much or withholding medication.
- Sexual abuse: Any nonconsensual sexual contact, whether comprehended or not.
- Emotional or psychological abuse: Inflicting mental anguish or distress through verbal or nonverbal acts such as threatening, intimidating or humiliating.
- Neglect: Failure to provide food, clothing, shelter, healthcare or protection.
- Financial abuse: Illegal use, misuse or concealment of funds, property, assets or benefits for someone else's gain.
- Abandonment: Desertion of a vulnerable adult.

Who Is at Risk For Elder Abuse?

Elder abuse, as with all forms of domestic violence, can happen to anyone. Seniors of all ages, races, ethnic backgrounds, education levels and socioeconomic status can become victims of abuse. Older women are more likely to be abused than men, according to the NIA. But the CDC reports that physical abuse among senior men is on the rise, having increased 75% between 2002 and 2016 as compared with a 35% increase for senior women.

Other risk factors include:

- Being dependent on a caregiver for daily living activities, such as getting dressed, bathing, eating and taking medicine
- Having a physical disability
- Having dementia or memory problems
- Lack of support from other family or friends

Who Commits Elder Abuse?

Anyone can be a perpetrator of elder abuse. The person most likely to abuse a senior is a caregiver, whether that's an intimate partner, adult child, other family member or a paid caregiver.

Factors that make a person more likely to abuse an elderly individual include:

- Mental health problems
- Drug or alcohol abuse
- Exposure to abuse as a child
- Inadequate coping skills
- Financial dependence on the person being cared for
- Lack of caregiver support or access to respite services

Recognizing Elder Abuse

Unfortunately, a senior who is being abused may not come forward for a variety of reasons, such as fear of retaliation by the abuser, being financially dependent on the abuser or not knowing they're being abused. But no one deserves to be abused or neglected, which is why it's important for others to speak up if they suspect an older adult is being abused.

Anyone can report suspected abuse to adult protective services. If you believe the victim to be in imminent danger, call 911.

We raise over \$15,000 each year so they can attend. Teachers in turn provide "teacher treats" experiences that are auctioned at the event so our students can have a special time with their favorite teachers (Over \$25,000 raised in 2022).

A fun part of the evening is our Wine Pull which has over 100 bottles of select red, white, and sparkling wines valued at \$30 minimum, and bourbon valued at a \$40 minimum. Each year the wine pull alone raises \$2,500 for our school. We are
