# Fourth Sunday of Easter

**APRIL 30, 2023**

In today's Gospel, Jesus explains the role of the shepherd: "The gatekeeper opens it for him, and the sheep hear his voice, as the shepherd calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has driven out all his own, he walks ahead of them, and the sheep follow him, because they recognize his voice."

As I reflect on this passage, I am drawn to the words: "because they recognize his voice." How do we recognize the voice of God? This past week, our 8th grade school and Religious Education students were confirmed. During this year, I had the opportunity to teach one of the 8th grade RE classes and really had a chance to get to know the students.

One of my biggest hopes and prayers is that these students will truly spend time with God in prayer and learn to hear His voice. There are so many other voices competing for their attention. In this world of social media, our phones have become the way we communicate and learn. We know that in order to hear

from God we need to spend quiet time in prayer. This time requires that we put the phone away, remove all distractions and intentionally work at connecting with God.

In our class time together, prayer was a very important topic and we explored various ways to pray and using scripture in our prayer time. In my study of Ignatian spirituality, I learned how the Examen prayer can be a powerful way to be in conversation with God and invite Him into our day. I shared this technique as well as others with the students in hopes that they too would find ways to connect with God and hear His voice.

Jesus describes himself as the gate for the sheep and explains how all that came before him are thieves and robbers. He clearly tells us "A thief comes only to steal and slaughter and destroy; I

came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

He wants us to have an



abundant life, one filled with the joy of serving Him and finding our purpose in fulfilling our own unique mission. In Confirmation preparation, we ask the students to do "service experiences." This request is not simply to add a task to their very busy lives. Our hope is that they will choose experiences that touch their soul; that they will find something that uses the unique gifts God has given them and then be inspired to continue this service after Confirmation.

It is so wonderful when a student shares that they enjoyed the service and were so inspired by the experience that they intend to do it again in the future. It gives me hope that we have helped to make the connection of using our unique God given talents to make the world a better place.

We hear so much today about our youth needing guidance and assistance in finding such experiences. My prayer is that we have planted seeds that will continue to grow in the future. We know that it is the work of the Holy Spirit within each of us to continue this growth. I am grateful we can at least be part of planting these seeds. Although I most likely will not know the future for all of our candidates, I will keep them in prayer, with the hopes that they will be disciples of Christ and be able to hear His voice guiding them throughout their lives.





# GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


There is much we could ponder in today's Scriptures, but the verses that stood out for me are these: "If you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called." I have a hard enough time keeping my inner child under wraps when I suffer due to my own sinfulness or incompetence, and Peter is telling me to be patient when I suffer for doing what is good? Well, yes - "because Christ also suffered for [us], leaving an example that [we] should follow in his footsteps." And the clarity of this truth hits me smack in the face. Doing what is good means we are loving another, in some way; we are doing good, for good. We are engaging in self-sacrifice, and some form of suffering is inherent to that. But here's the thing: it's an oddly joyful kind of suffering because it produces good fruit and directs our thoughts and vision to the one who is present among us as "the shepherd and guardian of [our] souls." Let us pray for the ability to see each moment of suffering for doing good as "a grace before God."

## GO EVANGELIZE

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

At this point in the Easter season, we might think, "Why can't we focus more on the joy of Jesus' resurrection and less on the suffering that preceded it?" Well, we certainly can ... but we would lose a great part of the Paschal Mystery. We don't embrace the cross for the sake of suffering in itself. We come to the crucifixion to pass through it. We are an Easter people living in a Good Friday world. There's no avoiding suffering in our lives, but the Good News of Jesus Christ is that he has redeemed that suffering. He has given us victory over death and is - quite literally the way to eternal life. In the Gospel Jesus says, "Whoever enters through me will be saved ... I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly." He is our shepherd and we know his voice. During this Eastertide we have an extraordinary opportunity to attend to that voice in a particular way, and to think about how we might be hearing it in a new way this year.

**ACT** Is there a charity you have been meaning to call to volunteer your time? Is there a neighbor who might be able to use a helping hand? Is there a friend or family member who has fallen out of favor and you just know it's the right thing to do to get in touch? Act this week. Sacrifice just a bit for the sake of good.

#### What are we to do?

Discernment of our direction is not just a task for young adults. Throughout our lives, we're challenged to consider the course we're following and the consequences of our choices. The apostle Peter called his generation corrupt; in fact, it's a fair assessment of every generation that seeks personal profit at the expense of the common good. Our mutual vocation is to respond to God's call in every hour, with all our heart, mind, soul, and strength. Pray that you know the role you're called to play and have the courage and passion to live it out.

Religious Brothers Day is celebrated annually on May 1, which is also the feast of Saint Joseph the Worker as well as International Workers Day (known as Labor Day in some countries). The common theme is that they honor the often low-profile work of keeping church, family, and society running. The men and women who take up these tasks deserve more than one day of thanks—even though they're usually the type who never expect it. Maybe you're blessed to be one of them, who humbly serves and sacrifices and asks for little in return. On this day, and every day, let our gratitude be shown and felt for all the workers who dedicate their lives to making our lives better.

#### Tuesday, May 02, 2023

### Everything everywhere all the time

Thank Saint Athanasius upon reciting the word "consubstantial"—which used to be "one in being with the Father"—the next time you say the Nicene Creed. Athanasius, as deacon, did the theological homework for his bishop, Saint Alexander I, at the Council of Nicea. Together they resisted Arianism. Prior to the council, the central idea of Arianism had been slowly gaining traction among church leaders: that Jesus wasn't God, wasn't co-equal and coeternal with the Father as taught by the Christian doctrine of the Trinity. As Athanasius insisted of Jesus and the Incarnation, "there is no part of creation deprived of his presence; together with his Father, he fills everything, everywhere, at all times."

#### Wednesday, May 03, 2023

#### What remains is the legacy

Today the church celebrates the feast of two of the 12 apostles, Philip and James, a peculiar pair of martyrs not otherwise associated with one another in Christian history or tradition. James (also called James the Less) is regarded as the first Bishop of Jerusalem, while Philip was said to have preached in Greece,

Turkey, and Syria. The pairing of their feast days is related to their shared reliquary in the Church of the Twelve Apostles, following a secret move from the Roman Catacombs. Thereafter lost to history for some time, their relics were rediscovered in the church crypt in the 19th century. On this holy feast, let's all remember the sacrifices of the church's first teachers and model their lives of holiness and faith.

FEAST OF PHILIP AND JAMES, APOSTLES TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Corinthians 15:1-8; John 14:6-14 (561). "[Jesus] was raised on the third day . . . After that he appeared to James, then to all the Apostles."

### Thursday, May 04, 2023

#### We are a people with a history

When asked to speak at a gathering of the Jewish community in the early days of the church, Paul gives a history lesson. He recounts the liberating activity of God throughout Jewish history and ties God's activity directly to the arrival of Jesus the Messiah and the opening of salvation to all humanity. Our God is the God of history, and our human stories—personal and collective—are part of a much larger historical project of salvation. Play your part in the drama.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 13:13-25; John 13:16-20 (282). "Fellow children of Israel and you others who are God-fearing, listen. The God of this people Israel chose our ancestors."

## Friday, May 05, 2023

#### Witness this

Saints and martyrs are the shining lights when it comes to witnessing to Jesus the Christ, often giving their whole lives and their very lives to communicate God's great love. We too are called to be witnesses. "But I'm no saint!" one might protest. "I can't witness like that." You don't have to be! Pope Francis reminds us that "God guides history through the humble courage of those who pray, love, and forgive. There are so many hidden saints, saints who are next-door, hidden witnesses of life, who with little acts of love change history." Next time in prayer, ask God how you've been a hidden witness of God's great love.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 13:26-33; John 14:1-6 (283). "These are now his witnesses before the people. We ourselves are proclaiming this good news to you."

### Saturday, May 06, 2023

#### Choose your destination

Can someone really be destined, or "predestined," for eternal life? According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, our destiny as beings created by God is eternal life. But because we are free, we can choose to opt out of that destiny. Just like the people invited to the wedding feast in the Lord's parable, we can decide not to come or simply fail to show up. Just so, when we choose to live in hate rather than love, in violence rather than peace, in punishment rather than forgiveness, we're choosing another destiny. The choice is ours to make.
