May Celebrations

This weekend brings about many wonderful events in the Catholic Church at St. Ben's. This is the 7th Sunday of Easter and also the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. The commemoration of Jesus leaving the earthly world 40 days after his Resurrection and entering into Heaven, to sit at His Father's right hand, just as we profess each time we say the Nicene Creed. It's important to think of this Solemnity not as Jesus leaving us behind, but the link between His earthly life to that of the church.

Here at St. Benedict, we have also been celebrating something that brings great joy to our students, their teachers and administrators, as well. Over the last two weekends, we have celebrated four First Communion Masses for our second graders.

Though it's been some time, I can remember my excitement as my First Communion approached. I got to wear the same First Communion dress as mom and her three sisters, my whole family came together to church to celebrate, and of course, there was a party afterward! (who doesn't love a party?!?!).

Each Spring as our students prepare for this wonderful day, I also get excited for them, all over again! Hove watching their excitement (and sometimes trepidation) grow, hearing from them what they are looking forward to and having the privilege to be a part of Masses. This year, I sat in some of the classes as Fr. Steve stopped by to go over everything they had learned and to answer any lingering questions they still had. Some were very curious about how they would walk into the church – was it a single-file line, is it in two lines? What prayer should we say after we receive the Eucharist? Who is allowed to come to the First Communion Mass and would they have a place to sit? If you're not making your First Communion, are you allowed to come and watch your friends? These were some the great questions the kids came up with, among many (many) others.

Fr. Steve also reviewed with the students how they should receive the Blessed Sacrament – making a throne for Jesus with their hands – one on top of the other. They students also got to practice the entire ritual, including bowing, creating the throne with their hands, responding to the Eucharist Minister when he/she says "Body of Christ" and making the Sign of the Cross afterward. It's a lot of

things to remember, particularly when you're also trying not drop the Eucharist or trip over your own feet!

This upcoming week we will celebrate May Crowning Mass on Tuesday at 8:30 with our Kindergarten through 8th graders, bringing our First Communion season to a close. Our Second Graders will get to wear their special First Communion clothes to the Mass to form our honor quard for Mary. Some of the Fifth Graders will be a part of the court, carrying Mary into the Church and then having the honor of crowning Mary. This is often our Second Graders first time to receive the Eucharist at a school Mass. Being a Eucharistic Minister, I enjoy watching them take so much pride in themselves for remembering all of the steps to receive the Body of Christ and return to their seats. Every now and then a few of them look a little scared or concerned that they will be able to get it right, but with a little assistance are able to readily recall the steps and continue to move through the sacrament with ease. I'm not sure if it's all of the Marian hymns, the (usually) spring-like weather, the excitement for the second graders and fond memories of my own May Crowning Mass at St. Anthony School in Columbus, OH, but this day is truly one of my very favorite days of our school year and our school Mass celebrations. If you've never experience the SBPS May Crowning Mass, I invite you join us this week and partake in the beautiful Mass. If you are not able to join us, know that you'll all be in our prayers this week, and I ask that you keep our students, faculty and staff in your prayers, as well.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


Actions speak louder than words. How many of us have heard or said this exact phrase? I suspect most, if not all of us are quite familiar with this old adage. In fact, this is exactly what we are being told by Jesus himself in today's Gospel when he says, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations." Jesus continues his direction of action by telling us to baptize "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." We are not directed to simply speak about Jesus with our families and church communities, we are told to GO among all nations and add to Jesus' flock. We continue Christ's mission when we seek to spread his love. Before Jesus joined his Father in heaven, his instructions were very clear. This is an opportunity to think about the commission we were given as part of the baptized community, and how Jesus is asking us to take action in his name.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Easier said than done. We've all heard that one as well. It's hard to feel equipped to spread the word and the will of God. We worry our words will fail us and we will look foolish. We know we are not perfect, and wonder if that means we cannot possibly be Christ's hands and feet on this earth. However, today's reading from Ephesians provides us with the perfect prayer to give us hope and faith in the Holy Spirit as we set out to fulfill the Great Commission given to us in this week's Gospel: "May the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, give you a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of him." We are challenged to act for God, but not without being given the tools to do so with confidence.

PRAY Meditate on today's second reading from Ephesians. Read it as if your priest was giving you a blessing before you head out of your house each morning. Let it fill your soul with love and awe for our Father, and let it give you the confidence you need to play an active role in building his kingdom until he comes again.

He couldn't have foreseen the technological advances the 21st century would bring. Yet in 1967, Pope Paul VI appreciated the need for a World Communications Day. He established the Sunday before Pentecost as an annual reflection on the opportunities and challenges of presenting the gospel message to a global society. The press, movies, radio, and television all commanded great attention in his generation. The internet and cell phones exponentially increase the range today. What are we saying and absorbing through all this media? Be a discerning steward of words and images.

Rita of Cascia is the patron saint of abused wives because she herself was one. She endured years of verbal and physical abuse from her husband, and after he was murdered by a feuding family member, Rita became a nun. Read the U.S. Catholic Bishops' statement against domestic violence. On the USCCB website, you can also find downloadable "When I Call for Help" resource cards in English and Spanish that list signs of an abusive relationship and include the number of the National Domestic Violence Hotline. These are ideal for parish pamphlet racks, for placing in parish restrooms, and to raise awareness about domestic abuse. We owe it to Saint Rita to act.

Peace I leave with you

Twenty-five years ago today, citizens on both sides of the Northern Ireland conflict agreed—by referendum—to honor the Good Friday Agreement of 1998, ending nearly 30 years of bloodshed that took the lives of more than 3,500 Catholics and Protestants. For his dogged commitment to the work of peace and reconciliation, Catholic politician John Hume was named corecipient of the 1998 Nobel Peace Prize. Hume, who also received both the Gandhi Peace Prize and the Martin Luther King Award—the only person ever to receive all three peace awards—said, "Bloodshed for political change prevents the only change that truly matters: in the human heart." Pray for peace today, and consider reading the U.S. bishops' pastoral letter *The Challenge of Peace*, which turned 40 this month.

Today marks the sad one-year anniversary of the mass shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas. Let us pray for the 21 people who died that day, including 19 children. Let us pray for their families. Let us pray for anyone who would ever entertain even the slightest thought of causing such devastation. Today is also the feast of Mary, Help of Christians—a good day to pray for an end to gun violence. Consider this prayer to Mary, which begins: "Most Holy and Immaculate Virgin, Help of Christians, we place ourselves under your motherly protection. Throughout the Church's history you have helped Christians in times of trial, temptation, and danger. Time and time again, you have proven to be the Refuge of sinners, the Hope of the hopeless, the Consoler of the afflicted, and the Comforter of the dying."

WASHINGTON DC - 8TH GRADE

An 8th grade tradition at St. Benedict is the trip to Washington DC when 8th graders explore the history of our country and start to understand what we can bring as the future generation. Our class visited many memorials to honor sacrifices people made for our country. The World War II Memorial was a very reflective memorial that had a lot of symbolism, including ropes that connected the states and countries that fought with the US. The Vietnam Veterans Memorial was somber and moving and showed the pain people felt in going to war, especially when our classmate had the opportunity to trace the etching of the name of his grandfather's friend who lost his life in the war. We paid our respects at Arlington National Cemetary and saw The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the changing of the guards which is an extremely high honor and moving ceremony. One of the most special experiences was meeting Veterans and some students getting to speak to them about their experiences and thank them for their service and sacrifice. We learned about the difficulties faced in war and the lifelong challenges they have. Most importantly, one Veteran gave us the advice to "always choose the right path."

A visit that all students enjoyed was the visit to the Washington Monument where they got to take pictures and just enjoy the moment. The Lincoln Memorial, MLK Memorial, and FDR Memorial showed us the impact those people made in our country. The Holocaust Memorial Museum was one of the most meaningful places we visited, it is a living memorial for all the lives lost. As we visited the exhibits, we were curious to learn and were extremely saddened by the events of the Holocaust and the pain caused to so many people. During our time in DC, some of our favorite stops were the National Museum of the United States Army and the National Museum of American History where we got to see pop-culture things like the ruby shoes from The Wizard of Oz and gowns and dinner China chosen by the First Ladies. George Washington's Mount Vernon was an enjoyable morning trip into the past where we walked the grounds of where our first president lived.

One of the best parts of the trip were the surprise nights. On the second night of the trip, we went to a Washington Nationals baseball game where they played the Cubs and on the third night, we went to a boardwalk with a Ferris wheel! 
