Memorial Day Weekend, the unofficial start of the summer season, kicks off with a federal holiday to remember and honor the men and women who died while serving in the US military. Many of these deaths occurred fighting in battles to safeguard our freedoms which you and I enjoy each day.

Parents also have the freedom to send their children to Catholic schools, enabling the children to have a faith-centered academic experience recognized by the state and local government, and valued and respected by civil organizations and private businesses. On this Feast of the Ascension, I can't help but see a connection between this Feast Day and the Memorial Day holiday.

Just before Jesus ascended to heaven, Jesus reminded His disciples that they were witnesses to His life, death and resurrection. The disciples truly believed that Jesus is the Messiah and that He was the One promised to restore Israel. In the Acts of the Apostles this Sunday, we hear the disciples ask, "Lord, are you at this time going to

When I read this line, I envision the disciples waiting eagerly for some big, earth-shaking show of power, glory and restoration. But that wasn't the answer they heard.

Instead, Jesus said that the day and time really isn't for them to know. Rather, they were going to restore Israel by being Jesus' witnesses through the work of the Holy Spirit. Jesus told the disciples to stay in Jerusalem and wait for the Holy Spirt to come upon them; after this, they'd be given the power to share the Good News to all the ends of the earth. After Pentecost, the apostles were on fire with the Holy Spirit and changed the world, building the Church and God's kingdom here on earth. The courage to spread the Good News came at a cost, as many of the early Christians died for their faith. They paved the way for you and me to have the FREEDOM to teach others about Jesus.

The work of the Church started over 2000 years ago and continues today with you and me. We are part of this work and the story of the Church. We are called to be witnesses to Christ's life, death and resurrection. In America, we are blessed to have the FREEDOM to be witnesses and share our faith with others. We are blessed to have the FREEDOM to tell others of God's mercy, hope, love, healing and forgiveness through the death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus. We are blessed to have the FREEDOM to participate in the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion and Confirmation and boldly proclaim our membership in the Catholic Church. We are blessed to have the FREEDOM to allow our faith to shape the way we live, work, and play. We are blessed to have the FREEDOM to help build God's kingdom on earth.

I wonder how much I take these freedoms for granted. Do I see my faith as freedom or a burden? I pray that I have the courage to use this religious freedom to help bring others to the faith.

Catholic schools are an important part of the work of the Church and an essential service in a free society. As a community of believers, we help our young people know of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. We help prepare them to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation, First Communion and Confirmation. We model service to the vulnerable and less fortunate. Sunday, May 29, 2022 Jesus' Prayer for Us

Today's readings: Acts 7:55–60; Psalm 97:1–26–7, 9; Revelation 22:12–14, 16–17, 20; John 17:20–26. In today's Gospel, Jesus expresses a desire that the Father love his followers just as he loves his Beloved Son. He prays: "That the love with which you loved me may be in them and I in them." This prayer is for us as well as the disciples two thousand years ago. Jesus wants us to know the depth of God's love in every moment of our lives.

Jesus' prayer to the Father is not just that followers be embraced with love but that they be brought into a union with God. He implores "that they may also be one. As you, Father, are in me and I in you may they also be in us." In this prayer we see Jesus' desire for unity with all of God's children.

When life is most challenging, it is good to remember that Jesus prays for us to know and believe in God's love. These prayers assist us in witnessing to our friends and community that God is near. The gift of Easter is that we know and believe that the darkness of this world has no power over us, that sin and struggle will never have the last word. As we await the celebration of Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit, are you willing and open to witness to the joy of the Gospel to a world so in need of God's love and mercy?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, May 30 Take Courage

Jesus tells his disciples, "In the world you face persecution. But take courage, I have conquered the world." When we spread the Gospel, we do so knowing that Jesus has gone before us, and that his persecution, death, and rising, offer eternal life. We do not face the trouble in our lives by ourselves; our faith reminds us that we are never alone. *Today's readings: Acts 19:1–8; Psalm 68:2–3ab, 4–5acd, 6–7ab; John 16:29–33.*

Tuesday, May 31 Blessed Encounters

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Once Mary hears about her cousin Elizabeth being with child, as she is herself, the Gospel tells us she travels in haste to be with her. Elizabeth's greeting was both a comfort and affirmation for Mary. Today remember and pray in gratitude for the people in your life who, in times of challenge, support you. *Today's readings: Zephaniah* 3:14–18a or Romans 12:9–16; Isaiah 12:2–3, 4bcd, 5–6; Luke 1:39–56.

Wednesday, June 1 What Is the Truth?

For his disciples and for us, Jesus prays, "Sanctify them in the truth." The prayer commits us to being and saying what is true. Pray for the grace to know the truth in your life, and to be a witness of what is true—that is, every human being is created in the image of God and deserves to be treated with respect and dignity. Imagine a world that recognizes this truth. *Today's readings: Acts 20:28–38; Psalm 68:29–30, 33–35a, 35bc–36ab; John 17:11b–19.*

Thursday, June 2 Being One

What would our world look like if we believed that we are all called to be one as Jesus is with his Father? In and through our baptism, we are united with God and others in our faith community, and because of this union, we are to be a witness to others. How would striving for unity with all Christians change the way you pray, the way you live, and the way you make present God's love in our world? *Today's readings: Acts 22:30; 23:6–11; Psalm 16:1–2a and 5, 7–8, 9–10, 11; John 17:20–26.*


Friday, June 3 God Is Good and Kind

One of the songs from the musical *Godspell* was adapted from today's Psalm 103 "Bless the Lord, O my soul." The song and psalm remind us to remember the goodness and kindness of God. When was the last time you paused to thank God for something good in your life? When have you felt God's abundant kindness in your life? *Today's readings: Acts 25:13b–21; Psalm 103:1–2, 11–12, 19–20ab; John 21:15–19.*

Saturday, June 4 Stories to Guide Us

Scripture is a living, breathing revelation of God's life with humanity. Stories in the Bible are rooted in a certain time and place. But each of those stories holds a truth that is still relevant today. In our living out of our faith we continue to breathe life into the words of Scripture. Take some time soon to sit down with Scripture, discover the stories of our ancestors in faith, get to know Jesus better, and embrace the challenge of discipleship. *Today's readings: Acts 28:16–20, 30–31; Psalm 11:4, 5 and 7; John 21:20–25.*

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Praise Jesus." Those two words pack a powerful punch. We often say them with relief on hearing news of a better-than-expected prognosis, celebrating a milestone, seeing a beautiful sunset, or other moments when we feel God's presence. Jesus' ascension to the Father was clearly one of those moments. After Jesus was taken up into heaven, the Apostles "returned to Jerusalem with great joy, and they were continually in the temple praising God." We might wonder how they could do that, after watching Jesus depart. I think the answer is found in Paul's Letter to the Ephesians. The Apostles had what Paul desired for the people of Ephesus, and for all people: "a Spirit of wisdom and revelation resulting in knowledge of [Christ]"; enlightened hearts that know "the hope that belongs to his call" for all who believe. The Lord has brought us salvation: "Sing praise to God, sing praise; sing praise to our king, sing praise."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Jesus said, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." The Apostles took Jesus' words to heart, and we must too. In a homily in 2013, Pope Francis said: "The Ascension does not point to Jesus' absence, but tells us that he is alive in our midst in a new way. He is no longer in a specific place in the world as he was before the Ascension. He is now in the lordship of God, present in every space and time, close to each one of us." As the two men clothed in white reminded the Apostles, Jesus will return. And we know that he is not distant, but that he is fully present to us in a new way. His presence is felt through the workings of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in the sacraments.



How to Prepare Your Digital Footprint BEFORE You Leave an Abuser

Creating independence and protecting your safety when preparing to leave an abuser can be a challenging balance, especially when considering that certain actions can alert an abuser to the fact that you're preparing to leave, thus putting you and your loved ones in further danger.

Below are some recommendations that aim to set you up for independence and a successful escape, without putting you in a potentially life-threatening situation. Please read them carefully and follow them to the fullest extent that you can:

- Create a new email address unknown to an abuser or partner.
- **Consider getting a new phone number, as well.** While smartphones are convenient, they are also equipped with technology that enables tracking. Consider a pay as you go phone for privacy. Explore the FCC's Lifeline program for financial assistance security mobile or broadband access.
- **Do not link or use an existing account for confirmation/backup** to avoid sending notifications to an abuser that would alert them of the new account's existence. Alerting an abuser of something like this can further endanger the victim of abuse.
- Change your passwords to complex passphrases an abuser would not guess.
- Use a virtual private network (VPN) to remain anonymous while browsing the internet, signing a new lease or applying for a new home loan. This will also keep your location anonymous from anyone who has gained access to or infiltrated your device.
- Apply to the address confidentiality program in your state to set up a confidential mailing address. Check this list to see if you are eligible. Some states offer motor vehicle registration and health insurance confidentiality, as well. If you're not eligible or your state doesn't offer this program, open a post office box to receive mail.
- While it may seem counter-intuitive, don't close accounts that you both have access to. This could alert your abuser to the fact that you are planning an escape. Learn more details on how to prepare your finances when leaving an abuser.
- Be aware of location tracking in apps and set privacy settings on devices and social media accounts to the most secure option.
- Whenever possible, avoid networks that you share with your abuser, especially when taking the aforementioned steps. Use a computer in a public library, internet cafe or a VPN on your device. Open a new line of credit and let the creditor know of your situation, tying your new line of credit to your new email address and phone number. Notify the company of your abuser's information to prevent their access to your account - even if you are still legally married or in a partnership.
