The word of God continued to spread, and the number of the disciples in Jorusalem increased greatly.

This weekend we hear an interesting 1st reading from the Acts of the Apostles. It is the story of the first Deacons. The Deaconate is a great blessing in the Church, which we celebrate even through today.

Notice that the Apostles were in a position where they were trying to preach the Word and give direction and structure to the early Church. However, there was so much that they needed to do, that they were having trouble keeping up with everything. In addition to all their other tasks, the Church was known for its service to those in need. But, the number of those in need was too great, and the Apostles simply could not keep up with everything. Therefore, they asked the community for the names of disciples who could be called forward to serve in the ministry of service. Therefore, we see the beginning of the Deacon.

Now Holy Orders is a Sacrament that helps provide a holy order or structure to the Body of Christ: The Church. There are three ministries in the Holy Orders. We have the Deacon, the Priest, and the Bishop. The Bishop is the successor to the Apostles, and continues that special role of leadership, which guides and governs and teaches the members of the Church. Our local community is the Church of Chicago. Our Bishop is Cardinal Cupich. He is entrusted with that task of guiding and governing this local Church. But, he could not possibly take care of all Catholics in Chicago. He has a number of men who serve in Holy Orders called Priests. Our role is to assist the Cardinal at each local parish. Now the Diocese of Chicago is so large that

the Cardinal needs extra help so he also has other Bishops to assist him called Auxiliary Bishops. Each Auxiliary Bishop watches over a section of parishes called Vicariates.

Each parish has priests to help the Cardinal serve a smaller group of people called a parish. In addition, many parishes have Deacons to assist the local priests. Here at St. Benedict we are blessed with two priests, and we have one Deacon who serves the Church. Now while the priest serves full-time in the ministry of the Church, a Deacon has a job and assists part-time as his life allows him to work. We also have a part-time Deacon at the St. Kateri Center.

This is a good weekend to say a prayer of thanks for our two Deacons who are willing to give of their life in service to our community. The reading from the Acts of the Apostles shows the importance of the Deacons working in the community. But as the Church continues to grow it soon becomes clear that for the Body of Christ to grow in faith, many more ministers will be necessary. Over time the increased ministries that have grown in the life of the Church need more ministers for all of us to live in service to one another. So this weekend, besides taking time to pray for our Deacons, I would ask you to pray and discern two things. Do you feel a call to a ministry?

If you are a man in the community who has served this parish, and feels that God may be calling you to deeper service, I invite you to pray

to the Lord to see if you have a call to become a Deacon. This is a multi-year process, which requires

studies and preparation. If you would like to know more, please talk to one of the priests or Deacons.

While a call to serve as a Deacon is a call to the Sacrament of Holy Orders, there are many other ministries in the Church that allow us to serve the Body of Christ. These ministries all involve some formation and preparation. We are looking at ministries like Eucharistic Minister, Lector, Usher, Minister of Care, or Audio Visual team. We have ministries like Catechist, liturgy team member, or Art and Environment Committee. There are many other possibilities as well. If you would like to consider a particular ministry here at St. Benedict, please talk to one of the priests, or anyone in one of those ministries. We would be happy to explain what the ministry is like and what type of formation might be given for service.

Of course, besides a ministry, there are also clubs and groups that gather to grow in faith and service. The more of us that play an active role in the community, the bigger and more helpful the Body of Christ can become.

To everyone who is an active part of the community: Thank You! To anyone who is considering playing a bigger role in the Body of Christ: Welcome! All service of God and the people is important and worth celebrating.

Acts 6:1-7 | 1 Pt 2:4-9 | Jn 14:1-12

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Recently, I went through a period of spiritual dryness, and I questioned my ability to make faith the central tenet of my life. Although I had always loved reading Scripture, I felt I needed reassurance that God was truly present with me. So I did what many people do: I asked God for a sign that he was real. Nothing happened. The sky didn't open; doves and rays of light didn't magically appear announcing God's presence. Although I didn't receive what I envisioned as a "heavenly sign," I looked down at the Bible in my hands and realized that God's word, handed down through the millennia, had been my companion all this time and was indeed the "sign" I was looking for. Which is why Jesus' question to Philip in today's Gospel struck a chord with me: "Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me?" If Jesus asked me this same question, I want to be able to answer, "Yes, Lord, I know you through your sacred word, through partaking of the Eucharist and through the strength and guidance of the Holy Spirit who is with me each and every day."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

What does "knowing Jesus" mean for me in my everyday life? It means hearing his words and acting on them: "I am the way and the truth and the life ... If you know me, then you will also know my Father." In following Christ, we know that Jesus is in the Father and the Father is in him. Jesus Christ is God! And as we heard in the second reading from Peter, we are not Christians on a lonely road; we are living stones that form a spiritual house. We are "called out of darkness into his wonderful light," as he describes it. Therefore, let us not be afraid to lean on our fellow Christians when we need support. And then, of course, we turn to Jesus, the cornerstone, the bedrock of our faith, and rejoice in his love for us.

ACTION Faith is rarely a straight path - sometimes there are sharp curves, steep hills, or roadblocks. If you feel lost or could use someone to talk to about faith, reach out to your parish and ask about contacting a spiritual director. Come, Holy Spirit, and fill me with your grace.

Appointed to the task

We see them in some of our parishes standing near the presider at Mass: men dressed sort of like priests but with a diagonal or odd-looking stole. What are deacons for, we may wonder? Deacons assist priests in visiting the sick and provide service in the parish community. They can preach, witness marriages, perform Baptisms, and preside at funeral services outside of Mass. While they're ordained clergy, they may also be married and serve without pay. The permanent diaconate is a special call for those "filled with the Spirit and wisdom." Know someone who fits this description? Encourage him to apply.

Sanctity can't be rushed

Of the approximately 10,000 canonized saints, there are only 11 from the United States, and only three of those were U.S.-born. Of course, part of the reason is that the United States is a relatively young country. Give it time, Blessed Teresa Demjanovich would likely say, because she believed her calling was to remind everyone that they are called, regardless of vocation, to be a saint. Born in New Jersey in 1901, Demjanovich is one of a growing list of American candidates for sainthood and the first to be beatified on American soil. She was a Sister of Charity for only two years before dying at the age of 26. Take to heart her message that everyone is called to a life of holiness and aspire to join her on that list.

Advantage from adversity

On this day in 328, 30-year-old Saint Athanasius was elected the new bishop of Alexandria. If that seems young, it was. Even though he helped win the day at the Council of Nicea—taking on Arius and others who denied Christ's full divinity—his elevation as bishop instigated years of struggle with political and ecclesial foes. At issue: Athanasius' stubborn refusal to water down anything in the Nicene Creed. Thus, in the 45 years Athanasius served as bishop, he was exiled a total of five times, 17 years in all. May Athanasius provide a lesson for us all about turning adversity into advantage. While in exile, he did much writing—including a definitive biography of Saint Anthony that would influence other future saints, including Augustine.

A mighty pen

On this day in 1990 the famed Southern writer Walker Percy died, one of the clarion voices of reason in the troubled climate of his day. He lived through Jim Crow, being born near the height of it, and wrote with the power of his deep Catholic faith to issues of the day. A graduate of medical school, Percy would in the end become

one who probed minds and hearts with the pen—including his own. He famously said, "A fine writer's thoughtful analysis of his own trials and errors is valuable indeed." May we emulate his admirable introspection.

Rejoice and be glad!

Doesn't everyone seek a bit of joy? Jesus tells his disciples, "Remain in my love ... so that ... your joy may be complete." Our tradition uplifts those who are joyful even amid setbacks. The concept of the Paschal Mystery points to resurrection—joy—hidden in even the darkest times. Pope Francis often encourages church leaders to show some joy, and he reminds the faithful that God "created us because he wants us to be happy." Jesus' first miracle enabled wedding guests to drink wine and celebrate. Does your faith in God bring you joy? Let others see it.

Here's to good friends

Saint Teresa of Ávila had a deep understanding of the value of friendship, not only with God but with one another. "What a great favor God does to those he places in the company of good people," she wisely wrote. Negative people can actually affect your well-being on every level: spiritually, mentally, emotionally and physically. Numerous studies conclude that surrounding yourself with good people boosts self-esteem, helps you bear stress and grief more effectively, encourages healthy behavior, and increases your chances for a longer and happier life. Your time is a valuable—and limited—resource. Surround yourself with friends and associates who will do you good. Then return the favor.

There he studied Indian spirituality and incorporated into the monastery cultural elements of a Hindu ashram. He became known to his congregants as Swami Dayananda, a name that means "bliss of compassion." LIL' BENGALS ON THE FARM



Maybe you're afraid of what your parents will think. Or, what they'll say. Maybe you feel embarrassed or ashamed to bring it up. But if you're concerned that you might be dating an abusive partner (or just have questions about what a healthy relationship looks like), your parents might be your best allies.

Aside from physical dangers, being the victim of dating violence at a young age puts you at greater risk for lower grades and depression. When you're silent about what's happening, you can end up isolated from your friends, and it can become harder to get out of the situation.

Understanding a relationship with an abusive partner—and how to leave safely—can be difficult, and your parents can help you to figure out your options, or can help you connect with a trained domestic violence advocate to learn about safety planning. Remember, the thing your parents want most is to keep you safe, no matter what that takes.

But even when you know your parents are on your side, it can still be hard to open up to them. Here are a few tips for making the conversation a little easier.

- 1. Find a time and place you're comfortable. You probably don't want to have a serious conversation about your relationship in the school parking lot, for example. Tell your parents you need some time and would like to speak with them privately. That might mean younger siblings are in bed or at a friend's house. Create the environment you need to feel comfortable.
- 2. Consider giving them some notice. There's a good chance your parents understand more than you think. But if you're concerned about how they'll react, consider telling them in the morning a little bit about what you want to talk about that evening. That will give them time to process their own emotions and come to you with more resources.
- **3. Get them prepared.** Your parents may have never had this experience before, so you may even want to refer them first to Loveisrespect.org, so that they are prepared to be a better support for you.
- **4. Tell the whole story.** Your parents want to understand what is happening in your relationship. Trust them, and tell them the whole story. This will help them be able to better help you.
- **5. Be honest.** Your parents might ask you about specific events and how they made you feel. They might ask what you want to happen now and how you want them to help you. Be honest about your thoughts and feelings
- **6. Develop a plan.** If you feel you're at risk for personal harm, talk to your parents about safety planning. What steps do you need to take to stay safe? Should they contact your school? Do you need to change passwords on your social media accounts? Do you need a cell phone for emergencies (if you don't already have one)? Is legal action a path you want or need to consider at this point?

If you still feel you can't talk to your parents, don't go it alone. Talk to an adult you trust—a grandparent, aunt or uncle, a leader at your church, a school counselor or other advisor. You can also find support with Loveisrespect, an organization specifically created to help young people understand and prevent dating violence. 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
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
