Just last week, my wife and I celebrated a joyous achievement, our son's first birthday! When I found out that I was going to be a father, I thought back immediately to my childhood. The many things I did with my father and the many learning experiences that came about from them. I thought about what it would be like to hold my child for the first time, baptizing my child in the church, teaching him how to walk, talk, and love others. There was so much I thought I had all figured out, my wife and I planned for 9 months. We did in-depth

research, purchased tons of products, spoke to friends and family, prayed, and discussed plans on how we would approach major parenting



decisions. However, in the end, there was no amount of past memory, planning, or preparation that could convey the overwhelming emotion that comes with a new child. There were so many

thoughts and feelings that went through my head when I welcomed my son into the world, I thought I was going to lose my mind.

There was one thought which has continued to captivate me, for whatever reason I cannot seem to satisfy my thirst for an answer. What is life? We are blessed with a life in this world, from a creator in another world, we have no thoughts. recollection, or idea of who we are or where we come from. We have no idea how the body we have been blessed with works, but yet somehow it does what it has to in order to survive. Remembering the first night I spent next to my son, I didn't sleep more than 30 minutes that night because I was afraid that something would happen to him if I wasn't focused and awake. Two days went by, and I distinctly remember being so anxious and exhausted that I grew nauseous and had micro panic attacks. Finally, my father called me, and I explained to him what I was going through, he marveled at my situation and welcomed me to fatherhood.

Time went on, my son and I learned our new routine. We wake up, he gets food from mom, he observes the world, then goes back to sleep. This continued for a couple months, brief windows of observation, eating and emptying, followed by lots of sleep. I always felt bad for my son because he never knew what he was missing out on, there was a whole world in motion around him, but all he knew was food and sleep. So, what if there was more to life that I was blind to as well? I have a routine, could it be possible that I too was blind to the truth around me? Our God created the entire Universe and all creation, trillions of stars, infinite space, and billions of years in the making - all I know is 26 years ago life started for me and Chicago is where it has taken me.

In January, we all got Covid. My son was 6 months old; he could not crawl but had just learned how to roll over. Suddenly, a child who was getting comfortable in this new world was being introduced to the pain that is involved with being sick. With my wife and I also infected, it was a struggle to say the least. My son would have lots of boogies and required medication to heal. I could only imagine what he was thinking. The confusion and fear, he spent a lot of time holding on to mom over those two weeks. I also was afraid; I unfortunately got the worst of Covid

in the family. There were moments where to breath was a struggle and coughing seemed to be endless. My fear however was not because of my suffering, but instead was due to the thought of not being here for my son. For life is not eternal in this world, and for the first time in my life, this actually mattered to me. I never feared death in my life, I always had faith that when I died, I would meet my creator; but now, that has all changed. Life has become precious; I want to be here to see my son as he grows and develops.

By the end of February, it came time to baptize my son. This was one of the happiest days of his life for me, because today was the day that my son would join the church. As Father Thomas held my son over the water, my son looked down and touched the water with his



toe. He audibly gasped, everyone smiled with anticipation just as he was fully submerged. Then just as he entered this world from his mother screaming, he entered this church screaming as well! I couldn't help but think how this is not the way he would have preferred to answer God's call to the community, ironically, I don't think anyone is ever thrilled with the call to carry their cross in the end. There were so many moments that day, from the crying as he endured the baptism itself, to the joy and smile as he feasted on delicious food as a reward at the reception. All this made me think about how we respond to God in our life. Most of the time, we do everything in our power to avoid uncomfortable and painful experiences, but ultimately it is the painful moments that bless us the most in life.

Jumping forward one last time, my wife and I found ourselves on a hot day in June building tents, decorating tables, setting up toys, and cooking food. Preparing for friends and family to make their way to our home for a day of celebration. My son turned one and we worked so hard to have the best for him that day. It was



exhausting, my feet, back, and head all hurt. I smelled like a smoker. My hands felt like I was digging ditches all day. My wife and I sat on the floor and tried to justify why one of us deserved to shower first, when all of a sudden, I looked over to my son who was surrounded by tons of new toys. Big toys, loud toys, colorful toys, a children's paradise; but yet, he was playing with a \$3.99 bouncy ball that my wife got from

the Goodwill. We did all this work, he got all these amazing blessings and gifts, and yet it was the most insignificant blessing which made him the happiest. At that moment everything started to make sense.

You see, life is an adventure. It starts slow and confusing, not always sure what to do. Once you are comfortable and secure in a routine, challenges finally arrive. You will need to persevere and fight to stay alive and do well for yourself. But if you answer Gods will and allow him to show you the way, you will be rewarded for the fight you endured. In the end however, all

the money, power, and success will not make you happy – for it is the little things that you gather along the way that truly fulfill your life. Being a parent for one whole year has taught me a lot; while I still have much to learn, I am always thankful for the time God has given me and the many blessings I have received along the way.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

So what comes to mind when you imagine your dream road trip? A well-planned route with scenic stops, nice hotels, good restaurants and quirky sights along the way? Jesus may be my copilot, but given his words in today's Gospel I'm not sure I'd want him to be my travel agent! As he sends the 72 ahead of him, he gives them no illusions about the mission that lies ahead: "Go on your way; behold, I am sending you like lambs among wolves. Carry no money bag, no sack, no sandals." Settle for the first house that welcomes you, regardless of the amenities. Eat and drink whatever they offer. Give those you encounter a greeting of peace and remind them the kingdom of God is at hand. As always, Jesus gives these travelers all they will need to share the Good News with others. They return rejoicing! The early disciples refute my "travel agent" doubts, as they show us by example to place our trust in God and take nothing for the journey except our faith and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. In doing so, we can rest assured that our "names are written in heaven."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I'm a planner. When we went to Disney World, my sons split off from me after I unveiled an app that would show us exactly which ride or attraction to hit based on crowd numbers, time of day and other variables. I loved that app! So had I been one of the 72 we read about today appointed by Jesus to spread the Gospel in pairs, hopefully my companion would not have abandoned me because of my insistence on planning. Ultimately, our journey of faith – as we share it with others and walk toward the kingdom ourselves – is not something we can choreograph. The more we plan and the more baggage we carry, the less likely we are to hear God's voice cutting through the noise. By stripping away the nonessentials, we can place our trust in the Lord, who will show us the right path. When we place our lives in the service of the Lord, the harvest will be abundant.

PRAY Many U.S. dioceses will be welcoming newly ordained priests this month. Pray for them as they begin their ministry, and pray for more vocations.

Catholics were a small minority in America's colonial period—at the end of the Revolutionary War, there were only about 25,000 Catholics in the United States out of a total population of 3 million. Today there are 70 million Catholics in the United States, or 22 percent of the population, and for many years Catholics have made up about a third of the U.S. Congress—more than any other denomination. With the values of our faith, Catholics have made countless contributions to the betterment of our country through myriad kinds of service—what's yours?

When confronted by a suspicious husband and ordered to reveal what she was hiding, roses tumbled from her wrap instead of bread. Many saints, including Juan Diego, Dorothy, and Rita of Cascia also had miraculous encounters with roses. Pope John Paul II once pointed out that the thorns of these roses remind us of worldly trials—but their enduring fragrance represents the love of Christ.

On this day in 2017, the most recent gathering of the National Black Catholic Congress (NBCC) began in Orlando, Florida. The NBCC was founded by African-American Catholics as a successor to Daniel Rudd's Colored Catholic Congress movement, which had been dormant since 1894. Since 1987, the NBCC has gathered black Catholics from around the United

States every five years for fellowship and to discuss a pastoral plan to be published by the Congress after each meeting. The NBCC is governed by the nation's black bishops, a group active since the first ones were appointed in the late 20th century. May we all draw deeply from the wellspring of our cultural heritage to enrich the church.

Today's gospel begins with Jesus' command that his apostles declare the "kingdom of heaven is at hand." Pope Francis has noted that seeking the reign of God involves boldness and adventure. Seeking the Kingdom, he once told a Sunday Angelus audience, is the "opposite of a dull life: it is a treasure that renews life every day and leads it to extend towards wider horizons." Those seeking the reign of God, he continued, "have a creative and inquisitive heart" leading them to "new paths" for loving God, neighbor, and themselves. Has your quest for the Kingdom taken you on unexpected journeys?

One ancient tree worth noting is the cedar, which has deep spiritual roots in Hebrew and Christian tradition. It is long-lived, evergreen, fruit-bearing, and a place of refuge—all characteristics of Yahweh and Mary, in her role as Mother of God and protectress of the church. The next time you feel vulnerable or distant from God, call to mind the grand cedar and know that divine comfort awaits if only you seek its reach.

Creed and culture are not the same

European missionaries were pouring into China during the 19th century, bringing with them not only the Christian religion, but also the European culture that they believed was part and parcel of the practice of the faith. Chinese reception of Christianity was mixed. Many Chinese saw it as a cultural invasion since some missionaries condemned customary Chinese practices like veneration of ancestors as demon worship. Augustine Zhao Rong represents 87 Chinese Catholics and 33 Western missionaries who were killed during a period of anti-foreigner resentment that followed. Be mindful that your evangelizing always be accompanied by respect and sensitivity.

Human Concerns



There is a way to escape with your children despite threats, fear from abuser Threats are used on many survivors of domestic violence by a controlling partner. They are manipulation tactics, but also very real threats that, unfortunately, can come true. So how do you leave safely with children?

Understand Your State's Child Custody Laws Before you go, it's a good idea to understand your local parental and custody laws from a domestic violence advocate or through an attorney, since laws do vary by state. You can also find a summary of custody laws online. After you flee to a shelter, you should follow up as soon as possible with an attorney to chart the best course of legal action going forward. Usually, the shelter can help you with connecting to legal advice, often free or low-cost.

How Does a Restraining Order Affect Child Custody? Children can be included in orders of protection. This can mean the abuser won't be able to threaten you with kidnapping or have visitation until you both go back into court to work out the details of the arrangement, but laws do vary by state, so make sure to ask the court or an attorney what those are.

If Possible, Prepare Before You Escape Talk to an advocate to create a safety plan. Locate a shelter near you where advocates are usually available 24/7 to help survivors create safety plans, which is a blueprint for how and when to leave safely. Leaving can be the most dangerous time for survivors, so, if possible, plan ahead of time where you'll be going (a shelter, friend's house the abuser doesn't know, a hotel or short-term rental or another option) and how to get there safely. You can involve your children in safety planning as well.

Keep records A journal or diary that documents the dates of the abuse (whether physical, psychological or emotional, financial or any other type of abuse), details on each episode, phrases used by the abuser, images, and names of any witnesses can be helpful when you go to court for custody or an order of protection. Be sure you keep your diary safe from the abuser at all times.

Pack a bag Keep it in a place other than your home (your work or a friend or relative's house). This should include your children's birth certificates or immigration papers, social security cards, backup supplies of necessary medications, diapers, formula and some cash.


Going to Court Comes Next A child custody agreement must eventually be made in family court. Matters such as joint or sole custody and visitation rights need to be decided. While it may seem unfair and burdensome to have to engage in a custody battle after experiencing abuse, it is a normal part of the process when parents of children go separate ways. It's important that the protective parent be prepared for this as much as possible. Child custody laws vary by state and courts should consider potential dangers to the children or trauma from witnessing past violence when making custody determinations.


