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

A few years ago I had to buy a car. My previous car, which I had for 13 years got into an accident and although it was merely a dent, they "totaled" the car. After purchasing a car, the saleman took me aside and showed me the invoice. On it were the initials: AMDG. I had seen this before, but though it meant something else. The salesman asked if I knew what that meant. I told him that it is the initials of the Jesuit motto: Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam, He told me that the owner of the car dealership was a Catholic who went to a Jesuit school, so always had this put on all his papers. It's a noble thought.

The motto can be translated as: for the greater glory of God. Saint Ignatius used it when founding his companions for Christ, or society of Jesus, or simply the Jesuits.

I mention this because today is the feast day of the founder of the Jesuits, Saint Ignatius of Loyola. He lived an interesting life. He came from a wealthy family and wished to be a soldier and make it a career. Service to the king and rescuing princesses were his fantasy. During one battle early in his career, he was hit by a canon ball which seriously damaged his right leg. He was confined to bed, hoping for the best but fearing the worst. During his time in the tower of his father at Castle Loyola, he asked for some reading material: romance novels. Given that the castle had no romance novels, he read the only thing that they had: The Bible, and lives of the saints. Although wishing to romanticize his career as a soldier, saving towns from dragons and evil forces, being at the service of the king, and rescuing damsels in distress, he now turned to the lives of the saints. Something struck him in all his readings: although he could fantasize about being a knight in shining armor, he could be that soldier for Christ in reality. It was Saint Francis of Assisi who also wished the same. His fantasies were enjoyable but left him unhappy, while stories of the saints brought great joy and left him wanting more.

So after months of recovery, Ignatius went to the Holy Land and returned to spend some time in prayer. After a year of so, he went to school to learn theology. There he met other students who also were interested in his zeal for Christ. He made them go on a 40 day retreat in silence



before embarking on this new quest. Hence, the beginning of the Society of Jesus.

Some of the stories of the saints that he hung around with and the saints who joined the Jesuits are also inspiring! If you ever have time, I would encourage you to read the stories of the saints. Start with the saint of the day, or choose your favorite.

I remember a holy man I ran into a decade ago. He shared with me that each night before bedtime, he would pick the story of a saint and tell it to his children. They loved him telling stories, and these must have had an impact on them. None of them became a priest or a sister, but all of them are devout Catholics and continue to share that Faith to their children.

One other thought. Speaking of romance novels: have you ever heard of the novel, The Mass of Brother Michel? It's an old book out of print now, but a book that contains a lot of wisdom. I first heard about this romance book in the seminary, when one of my classmates found it and thought every person in the seminary should read it. I dismissed it since it was a work of fiction, but after ordination came across the book and read it myself. Wow! He was right. Let me give you the beginning of the story:

There once was a man who came from a wealthy family. He had everything going for him: he was engaged to be married to a beautiful woman and his family supported him

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so he had no need to work for a living. Tragedy struck and he was thrown from a horse in a terrible accident that left him disabled for the rest of his life. He lost everything. He lost his fiancé, his family stuck him in a monastery and would have nothing to do with him. Thus begins the romance novel. See if you can find it to learn what becomes of Michel.

As I turn towards Saint Ignatius, I find many pearls of wisdom in his life and in what he said. It begins with Ad Majorem Dei Gloriam, but reminds me to do everything for the Greater glory of God. I hope you also have favorite stories of saints that you can share with others. They offer us hope in moving forward and growing in the spiritual life. In the last weeks of summer, if you have some free time, find a good spiritual book, maybe a story of a saint, and immerse yourself in a universe that reminds us of something greater than ourselves. Take some time to develop your spiritual life.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Is it me, or does every popular waiting-room magazine feature an article on "how to declutter" in six easy steps? I always read those first, then add them to the unsightly pile of magazines on the end table. The constant, if futile, quest to declutter comes from a deeper place than a desire for a clean house. It feels so liberating to let go of those things that we no longer need. Today's readings challenge us to look not just outward, but inward, at what distracts us from what really matters. Paul exhorts us to "seek what is above," letting go of earthly concerns or habits that get in the way of our relationship with God. By putting on a "new self" through prayer, the sacrament of reconciliation and receiving Jesus in the Eucharist, we will become "rich in what matters to God."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Personal-finance writers often divide people into two camps: Savers or spenders. I'm definitely a saver! I dutifully contribute to my 401K, stash unexpected windfalls into my savings account, and carefully budget. On the rare occasions when I go out to dinner, I struggle with choosing what to order: It's a high-stakes decision! Fiscal responsibility is a good thing, but today's parable challenges me to be just as diligent about investing in my relationship with God, my family, and the people I encounter. We are blessed with so many opportunities to "seek what is above": It may mean spending the first 30 minutes of the day in prayer, reading books or articles that help us grow spiritually, or joining a parish Bible study. Or even taking a friend to dinner and picking up the tab! In doing so, we are investing in this life – and the next.

ACTION Take a look around your house and donate items in good condition to a charity in your community. And then ask the organization if they need any help with a summer yard cleanup or simple tasks around the facility - these are easy ways to involve the whole family in serving others.

Dizzy yet?

Do you ever feel like the world is spinning out of control? You're not alone: Pope Francis has called this effect of modern culture "rapidification." It's not just you: Things really are happening, progressing, and becoming obsolete faster—including what many of us do for a living. We're not unlike the tragic lamplighter in Catholic author Antoine de Saint-Exupéry's classic, *The Little Prince*. The lamplighter's planet is turning faster, but he still operates at the same mortal speed. He must now respond to 1,440 sunsets where there used to be just one. Now more than ever, we need to honor our Sabbaths and take our rest.

Liguori might be the first to advise: Take a break from work to give back to the community and you might get your big break in finding your mission.

Sor Isolina Ferré Aguayo, M.S.B.T., a Missionary Sister, died on this day in 2000 after a lifetime of service to the poor of her native Puerto Rico and New York. Known as the "Mother Teresa of Puerto Rico," Aguayo served people living on the margins and opened schools and resource centers throughout Puerto Rico and beyond. For her tireless work, she received 17 honorary degrees and more than 50 additional awards including the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1999, bestowed for "her passionate fight

against poverty, violence, and despair in Puerto Rico and Brooklyn, New York, where she worked to reconcile rival gangs in 1950-1960." In endowing the award, President Clinton said Sor Isolina taught people "to see the best in themselves and in their communities." May we all serve so well.

Persistence is a virtue

Sometimes a vocation comes packaged with obstacles. Perhaps it is God's way of testing our resolve. In any case, John Vianney, born in revolutionary France in 1786, modeled persistence in his determination to become a priest. His religious training was disrupted by the anticlerical reign of terror unleashed during the French Revolution. Priests in hiding who risked their lives to administer the sacraments became Vianney's heroes, and once the church was reestablished, Vianney entered seminary. Today we know him as the patron saint of parish priests. May his story inspire us to overcome obstacles that keep us from our God-given vocation, whatever that might be.

Human Concerns



As part of our continuing mission of creating awareness of the scourge that is Domestic Violence, we turn to the subject of male victims. Historically, domestic violence programs were born from the women's liberation movement of the 1970s, to address the needs of female survivors, who – let there be no doubt - still represent the majority of victims seeking services today. But there is a growing acknowledgement that men can also be victims of domestic violence and must also be able to access resources that provide help.

Domestic violence against men deals with domestic violence experienced by men in a domestic setting, such as in marriage or cohabitation. As with domestic violence against women, violence against men may constitute a crime, but laws vary between jurisdictions. It has taken a long time for the authorities across the country to accept the reality of female vs male violence and many law enforcement officers still react with disbelief or scorn when a male victim presents himself to file charges against a partner.

It is important to remember, however, that some women do have the capability to be violent to their male partners and that males may also experience battering in homosexual relationships. Power and the misuse of power is key to understanding the dynamics of domestic abuse. And both genders are capable of inflicting pain through misuse of power.

Men who report domestic violence can face social stigma regarding their perceived lack of machismo and other denigrations of their masculinity. Since intimate partner violence (IPV) against men is generally less recognized by society than IPV against women, this can act as a further block to men reporting their situation. But that is changing.

The relative prevalence of IPV against men to that of women is highly disputed between different studies, with some countries having no data at all. Some researchers believe the actual number of male victims may be greater than law enforcement statistics suggest due to the number of men who do not report their abuse. For both men and women, domestic violence is among the most underreported crimes worldwide.

Everyone has the right to live free from fear. If you are a victim of Domestic Violence, regardless of your gender, know that there is help. You are not alone.

Places to Turn for Help:

- 1. A close friend or a trusted relative or a clergy member. This person can support you and help you begin to get professional help.
- 2. **Male Survivor** helps survivors of male sexual assault and abuse with weekend recovery workshops and a wealth of resources, including therapist, support groups, and resources directories.
- 3. **Center Against Domestic Violence** in New York City provides non-residential services such as counseling, advocacy, support groups, and legal assistance.
- 4. **Stop Abuse for Everyone (SAFE)** in Austin, Texas, also provides individual counseling and support groups for male survivors of domestic violence.

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
