This weekend's Gospel from Matthew was very poignant for me in light of events in my life these past few days.

I own a two flat in the Avondale neighborhood, Belmont and Pulaski. For years I have rented the upstairs flat to families and individuals. Five years ago, I rented the flat to Sister Diane Marie Collins. She was a Chicago Franciscan whose motherhouse was in Lemont. She had recently been hired at Saint John Berchmans Church in Logan Square to be the Director of Evangelization and the pastor, Father Patrick Marshall, knew that my apartment was available. Knowing me, it was important to him that Sister Diane move into the

two flat. He knew she would be safe and well taken care of. I embraced the thought and Sister moved in!

Sister Diane was a deliaht! She made the apartment her home for herself and her little Cairn Terrier. Aidan. Daily conversations ensued. We talked about everything, but especially church and what was happening in the Archdiocese with the Renew My Church initiative.

Believe me, it was a hot issue for her and she was in the thick of it with the combining of Saint John Berchmans and Saint Hedwig. I was Music Director at SJB before I retired and I knew Father Tomasz at Saint Hedwig. I was her sounding board and confidant. Behind the scenes I was a secret negotiator for her smooth transition to the combined parish. The parish loved her as did anyone she met. I loved her, too.

Then the pandemic came and our little two flat became our safe place. She promised to text me every morning to check on me and I did the same for her.

That happened each and every day without fail. We celebrated Thanksgiving and Christmas and Easter and all of

the birthdays. including her dog's, my friend José's who was living with me and my little puppy, Bailey. We shopped for each other and included all of us in weekly meals. She made great soup and a White Castle Casserole that she shared. I made meatloaf, chicken and mashed potatoes. We became dear friends and family.

Last Friday I arrived home early from Lake

Geneva where I was visiting my sister as I did not receive Sister's daily text that morning. I was nervous. I was panicked. I called Sister several times, but no answer. I was now very nervous. José called and relayed that he had texted Sister earlier to tell her that he was going out but that the back door was open and she could come and "kidnap little Bailey (whom she loved)" if she wanted to. But he received no reply.

I hurriedly parked the car and ran into the house. Running up the back stairs, I could hear music and I saw that the stove was on. I assumed she was making dinner. My panic and worry started to subside. Knocking on the door and running inside, though, I found Sister Diane lying on the floor in the hallway. She was cold and stiff. There was no life in her body. She was gone. I held her hands which were clasped in prayer. She was gone. The expression on her face was of peace. I cried. I sobbed.

That night, I remembered her favorite song that she used to sing, "Be Not Afraid".

It gave me peace and helped me go to sleep. Yesterday, one of her students from Madonna High School sent me a

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Unlike with our other important relationships, God isn't exactly someone we can meet for coffee and look into his eyes while having a conversation. Whether we talk to God in our mind or out loud, we recognize that even with a good prayer life it can sometimes be difficult to cultivate and maintain a relationship with God. Doubters and unbelievers are quick to remind us how impossible it is to believe what we cannot see or hear, but today's readings also remind us that God doesn't speak to us as another human being would. Maybe he doesn't speak with the booming voice of a preacher or a politician, and maybe he doesn't write direct messages for us in the sky or sand, but God does speak. Perhaps, like Elijah, we tend to expect God to communicate with huge gestures, such as strong wind that crushes rocks, or earthquakes or fires; but we hear today that God spoke to Elijah in a "tiny whispering sound." It's not unlike a very good teacher who doesn't need to raise her voice to get her students' attention when they lose focus - she has their respect and simply needs to speak normally and calmly and the students quiet down, pay attention, and listen. When we still our hearts and minds and listen, in prayer, let us be confident we will hear God's voice.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Perhaps in order to hear God's voice in our lives we need to fine-tune our "hearing." First, how can we hear if we do not have faith? Jesus called Peter out of the boat and into stormy waters, and though he was able to walk on water for a time, Peter began to sink because he became afraid. Doubt or fear can hamper our ability to listen to the Lord clearly; don't let it cloud your love for Christ! Second, we must keep in mind the many ways God speaks to us: his Word (the Bible), the writings of the saints and Church Fathers, our Catholic Tradition, other people God has placed in our lives, and the "tiny whispering sound" we might hear only within our heart. Stay attuned to God's voice; the rewards are heavenly.

INVITATION Ignatian spirituality - meditations, prayers, and contemplative practices - may help us recognize and truly hear the still small voice of God in our lives. The Daily Examen is a prayerful reflection on the events of the day which might help us identify the movement of the Holy Spirit in those moments. Give it a try.

This tradition holds that, just as Thomas was elsewhere when the other apostles were visited by a resurrected Jesus, he'd likewise been away when Mary, surrounded by the apostles, drew her last earthly breath. As Thomas returned to Jerusalem, three days after Mary's burial, it is said that he saw her gloriously lifted into the heavens. This time, it was the other apostles' turn to doubt Thomas. With great skepticism, tradition tells us, they opened her tomb and found it empty. Human Concerns



It's all too often heard that someone's partner is only mean/violent/abusive when they're drinking.

"If only he [or she] stopped drinking, we'd be fine."

Unfortunately, this argument seldom holds water. Put bluntly, says Larry Bennett, PhD, licensed social worker and professor at the Indiana University School of Social Work, "A batterer who quits drinking is a sober batterer."

While alcohol can't take the entirety of the blame for an abuser's behavior, Bennett says it's also incorrect to say they're not connected at all, either. "You can find plenty of examples of individuals who have been sober for decades and are still violent. By the same token, there are some cases where alcohol is almost toxic to the person, where they wouldn't do things when they're sober that they do when they're intoxicated." In a paper he co-authored in 2011 titled Substance Abuse and Intimate Partner Violence, Bennett found that research showed nearly half of all men in batterer intervention programs had substance abuse issues and that they were eight times more likely to be abusive on a day in which they were drinking.

"A common misunderstanding is that men who batter are extremely intoxicated and out of control when they batter," Bennett writes. "Despite the impairment in men's behavior caused by alcohol and drugs, IPV [intimate partner violence] remains a matter of choice. IPVusually occurs in a safe setting (for the batterer), selected for the protection it affords him, at a time of his choosing, with a predictable victim. The fact that violence rarely occurs outside men's comfort zone suggests that men who batter are very much in control, not out of control."

Bennett says he's heard similar accounts from many survivors he's talked to for his research: "Yeah, he's fine when he's drinking beer, when he switches to Jack, that's when I'm getting hurt." For a lot of abusers, drinking gives them a sense of entitlement to do what they do, he adds, and it's an excuse both abusers and some of their victims want to believe.

"Because why not? Why would you think someone you love would treat you like that if not for an outside reason like alcohol?"

Bennett says alcoholism doesn't cause domestic violence any more than poverty, depression or trauma history does, but like those factors, alcohol almost always makes existing abuse worse. "Abusers carry with them their aggressiveness, sense of entitlement and hostility. Unless you address those things, their behavior isn't going to change when sober."

He does acknowledge that he's found some abusers or would-be abusers who have enrolled in addiction treatment and, then, something clicks. "The haze goes away and they're this new person and they're open to new information. They're willing to examine their controlling behavior. For that select group, sobriety alone reduces domestic violence. But, that's not a very big group."

Bennett says survivors should be wary of any promises made their abuser. "Going to treatment, in itself, is a kind of control. If you allow yourself to be controlled by the belief or promise that he or she is going to change, you might be selling yourself short." Seeking advice via one of the hotlines or doing research on Domesticshelters.org is a good place to start.
