No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money. Matthew 6:24

You cannot serve both God and mammon. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that you cannot serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.

A "master" can be anything that enslaves us and Jesus' call to follow Him is a call to abandon all other masters. Jesus' teaching on not being able to serve two masters is part of His Sermon on the Mount. When we look at the earlier passages of Scripture that come before Matthew 6:24, we are able to decipher why we cannot have two masters. Jesus tells us that where we store up treasures for ourselves is where our hearts will be. In other words, where we put our hearts and invest our time is where our treasure will be. The attitude of the heart is what is in focus here. Our hearts cannot be completely devoted to God if our hearts are focused on money, passions, selfish desires, or anything else.

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As disciples of Christ, we have to examine ourselves. We have to honestly ask ourselves, "What is the master of my life?" Is God truly the master of our lives or is it something else? These are tough questions. One way to begin to focus on answering them is to look at how we are spending our time and what are our priorities in life. Do we put God first, loving Him with our whole heart, mind and soul? Or, are we focused on other priorities, those of the world in which we live? In today's secular society, we are easily distracted

In my study of Ignatian spirituality, one of the teachings is to look at what he calls "disordered attachments." The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius teach us how to identify our disordered attachments, and how to pray for the grace to release them. The resulting freedom lightens our load, and opens our heart to God more fully.

Another way of looking at this is as an entanglement. When Jesus first calls the disciples by the Sea of Galilee, the Gospels say the fishermen "dropped their nets," to follow him. Those nets are a great emblem for all that keeps us entangled in life.

Letting go of these entanglements can help lead us to true spiritual freedom. Spiritual freedom is an interior freedom, a freedom of the mind and heart. People who are spiritually free know who they are—with all of their gifts and limitations—and are comfortable with who they are. They are able to discern God's presence; find meaning in their lives, and make choices that flow from who they are, whatever the circumstance.

As we begin this new year of Religious Education, I am so grateful to all those that have decided to join our team, being part of this wonderful ministry to share their faith with our young people. Each year, the Catholic Church in the United States designates the third Sunday in September as "Catechetical Sunday"— a day on which to celebrate and pray for the Church's mission to teach the Gospel to all people. This year's theme is "This is my body given for you." With these words from the Gospel (Luke 22:19), the Lord Jesus offers us the gift of himself in the Eucharist. This theme reminds us that the object of all catechesis is Jesus himself. The role of the Catechist is, first of all, to be a disciple and one who draws close to Jesus in the Eucharist, and then to be a witness to others and a companion as they too come to know Jesus and to encounter him in the sacraments.

We also honor all parents as they truly are the "first catechists" passing on their faith to their children. We are thankful for all the families that have made the choice to ensure their children are formed in the faith. Catechesis will not be effective unless it is preceded and accompanied by fostering the personal relationship of children with Jesus Christ. Nothing and no one can replace the influence of parents on those entrusted to their care.

Join us in prayer this weekend for a blessed school year, one that will inspire our young people to live out their faith and grow in their discipleship.


Catechetical Sunday 2022

Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Our body language says a lot. Crossed arms can signal anger or defensiveness, while arms outstretched imply openness. It's unlikely Timothy researched nonverbal cues, but his encouragement to pray while "lifting up holy hands, without anger or argument" is good advice. I think this posture can carry into other areas of our life, including our relationship with money and/or possessions. If we cling to these, we risk closing ourselves off to life's true riches: our faith and our relationships, for example. As we learn in today's Gospel, we cannot serve both God and mammon. In our culture, it's easy to get caught up in accumulating more possessions or holding tight to what we have. Jesus challenges us to place our trust in God rather than the ups and downs of the stock market or our bank account. Let us, instead, approach Jesus in prayer, arms wide open.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I rarely miss a planned morning workout. I carefully lay out my clothes, go to bed early, and set my alarm. It helps to meet up with a friend for that added layer of accountability. These are all "small things," but they indicate my investment in the activity and help me build trust in myself and within my friendships. I wonder if we can't do the same when it comes to staying spiritually fit. For me, being "trustworthy in very small matters" is a bit like my workout routine. We don't need grand gestures to keep our relationship with Jesus strong: setting aside time in the morning to focus on prayer; going to Mass even when we don't feel like it; talking with a friend about ways to grow spiritually. In his letter, Timothy reminds his followers that prayer and devotion are "good and pleasing to God our savior." Should we become discouraged, we can find comfort in knowing that God wills everyone to be saved. Through prayer and seemingly small changes in our routine, we can challenge ourselves and encourage each other to make our relationship with Jesus our first priority.

ACT Think about your daily routine. What small change can you make to enhance your relationship with God? It may be as simple as saying a good-morning prayer or beginning a list of people and things for which you are grateful.

Tell the greatest stories ever

On this Catechetical Sunday, we lift up those who give instruction as religion teachers, homilists, RCIA directors, spiritual writers, and retreat leaders. Catechism doesn't have to be dull. Fantasy writer George McDonald made spiritual realities come alive. His stories inspired C.S. Lewis, J.R.R. Tolkien, Mark Twain, and J.M. Barrie to do the same. Want better leadership in government, businesses, parishes? Look for good storytellers. As Pope Francis said in his 2020 address to communicators, "Each of us knows different stories that have the fragrance of the Gospel, that have borne witness to the Love that transforms life. These stories cry out to be shared!"

See the miracles in everyday life

Little is known about the life of Januarius, a bishop and martyr who died in the year 305, but he's famous for a miracle that continues to happen all these centuries later. Three times a year in the cathedral in Naples, Italy, the faithful gather to witness a sample of his blood, kept in sealed glass, liquify and even bubble. There is no definitive explanation, and the blood cannot be studied since the vial is not allowed to be opened out of fear of permanent damage. Sound incredible? Some say yes. But does it even compare to the extraordinary tenets of your faith? Now that's something much more consequential to marvel—every day of the year.

Tuesday, Sep 20, 2022

Companions on the journey

South Korea has one of the largest Catholic populations in all of Asia. Andrew Kim Tae-gŏn—the first Korean priest—played a role. As did Paul Chŏng Ha-sang, a lay Catholic born of a martyr who was martyred himself. In fact, the birth of the Korean church is a laypeople's triumph. Pope John Paul II stressed this fact during his 1984 canonization of Tae-gŏn, Ha-sang, and 101 other martyrs: "Even though the Christians in the first half century had only two priests from China to assist them for a time, they deepened their unity in Christ through prayer and fraternal love.... The splendid flowering of the Church in Korea today is indeed the fruit of the heroic witness of the Martyrs." We, too, are called to be companions to the martyrs in building up the Body of Christ.

Even tax collectors need a patron

Though we don't know much about the apostle Matthew—even whether he was the actual author of the gospel that bears his name—we do know that he was a tax collector. And because of this, he was *persona non grata* in the Jewish community. It was the occupying Romans who demanded those taxes, so Matthew and his fellow taxmen were seen as collaborators. From the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus laid out the invitation to break out of righteous categories and see beyond narrow prejudices. A reminder for us to do the same.

FEAST OF MATTHEW, APOSTLE AND EVANGELIST TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 4:1-7, 11-13; Matthew 9:9-13 (643). *"I* did not come to call the righteous but sinners."

Celebrate Earth, our common home

Many Catholics are still getting used to the Season of Creation, which spans the period from September 1 (World Day of Prayer for the Care for Creation) to October 4 (Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi). Initiated in 1989 and embraced by Catholics in 2015, this ecumenical season is meant to celebrate care for our common home. Leaders encourage the faithful to pray and take action to honor and preserve our planet. With more than a week left of the season, there's time to celebrate in your own style: be it a prayerful outdoor time, an environmental letter to a legislator, or a look at the ecology encyclical, *Laudato Si'*. Seasonofcreation.org offers even more ideas.

Scripture makes Billboard's Top 10

We don't often see Bible songs hit the pop music charts. But a song by singer-songwriter and social activist Pete Seeger did just that. Written in the late 1950s, the song "Turn! Turn! Turn!" would explode to international popularity in 1965 when recorded by the Byrds. Not bad for lyrics written well over 2,000 years ago! The song is based on the book of Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. Not every popular use of the Bible turns out well, but Seeger's did, perhaps because he left the verses largely intact. Consider other scripture passages that are music to your ears.

The clock is ticking

The Spanish philosopher Miguel de Unamuno is quoted as having said the entire gospel came down to this phrase: "Wake up!" That's something we can all keep in mind and take to heart when we find ourselves simply going through the motions, sleepwalking through the day. The Benedictines put it another way: "Keep death ever before you." Now that's a wake-up call if there ever was one! Do something good, kind, generous—and do it today, while there is still time!

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

From the Domestic Violence Outreach Team at St Benedict Parish

DO WOMEN WHO STAY IN ABUSIVE RELATIONSHIPS LIKE

THE ABUSE? This may seem like a strange guestion but many people who don't understand domestic violence may actually ask this. Make no mistake: No one wants to be hurt, beaten or made to feel inferior. Women stay in abusive relationships for a number of reasons. Women may have nowhere to go. is better for their children to stay in a stable home. For many women, the reason they stay is because of fear. Statistics show that 75% of women who are murdered by their batterers are killed when they leave or after they leave the relationship.

WHY DO PEOPLE BECOME BATTERERS? There is no single reason for abuse. Violence is a means of trying to exercise power and control over someone else. Many batterers were victims of abuse as children or came from families in which spousal abuse was prevalent. It is important to remember, however, that not all people who were victims of abuse as children will turn into batterers.

CAN YOU IDENTIFY A POTENTIAL BATTERER WHEN YOU MEET HIM/HER? Just as there is not one reason for abuse. there is not one type of batterer. Many batterers are highly successful professionally and in other areas of their lives. With history and society to support their beliefs, they may have little remorse or regret over battering.

ARE VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE "WEAK PEOPLE"? The fact that people experience domestic violence doesn't make them inherently "weak.". Through manipulation and coercion, abusers often chip away at the victim's self-esteem. Sometimes this process happens so subtly that the victim is unaware of the psychological, emotional and other types of abuse that often precede a physically violent attack. In addition, it is important to note that many victims grew up in homes where there was excessive violence and turbulence. They may have seen their parents abuse alcohol and drugs, and consequently blamed themselves for the dysfunction and unhappiness.

WHAT DO ABUSED WOMEN WANT AND NEED? The first thing that an abused woman needs is to be safe. If she is in danger it is very difficult to think beyond the immediate crisis. She does not need someone to tell her to "snap out of it" or to insult her for being in her position. Basically, a victim needs support, someone who will listen to her, and she needs information about services. Above all, she needs respect.

IS IT TRUE THAT MOST VIOLENT RELATIONSHIPS GO THROUGH CYCLES – FROM TENSION BUILDING TO AN ACTIVE BATTERING INCIDENT, LEADING TO THE HONEYMOON OR REMORSEFUL STAGE? This pattern, called the "Cycle of Violence", came from the battered women's movement in the 1970's. The idea has changed over the years because many women found that their relationships did not go through these phases. For some people there is no honeymoon phase. Others do not see the tension building. Women's rights activists today have changed the model, renaming it the "Campaign of Violence". The new name suggests that the violence is ongoing and multi-faceted, taking a variety of forms.

ARE MEN VIOLENT BECAUSE THEY LOSE CONTROL? No. Domestic violence is not a form of losing control; it is an attempt at gaining control. Most acts of violence are premeditated, occurring behind closed doors. It may seem as though the batterer is losing control because of his angry behavior. To that end, most batterers are very good manipulators. They know how to convince others and their victims that they are not at fault for their actions.

IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE LESS OF A PROBLEM BETWEEN SAME-SEX COUPLES? Studies show that violence in samesex relationships is as common as it is in heterosexual relationships. Sometimes the violence is less noticeable because of preconceived notions about gender roles. When men fight, people tend to view it as natural, because "boys will be boys". Women, because they are stereotyped as sensitive and passive, are not expected to be violent.

DO DRUGS AND ALCOHOL CAUSE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE? The need to exercise power and control is the cause of domestic violence. Drugs and alcohol enable people to lose their inhibitions, and cloud sound judgment. As a result, violence may be exacerbated by the use of these substances. It is important to remember, however, that it is not the cause.

WHAT CAN I DO IF I, OR SOMEONE I KNOW IS BEING ABUSED? There are many options available to people who need help. You can look in the local phone book or in a community services directory for the phone number of a shelter and counseling services closest to you. You can talk to someone you trust, or call any 24-hour hotline. See the numbers listed below. - With thanks to Domesticshelters.org
