This year I again have the honor to introduce this year's Oktoberfest in my Sunday Sharing and wanted to find some more German words to share as we come to understand more

fully the importance of this coming weekend in our parish. So thanks to Google, I came across not only one word but two at Pediaa.com. My search was over. I had hit the jackpot.

According to the Pediaa.com site,
"Geldbeschaffung" is their word for fund-raising and "Gemeinschaft" is often translated as "community," refers to a group of individuals mainly characterized by a strong sense of common identity, attachment to traditional and sentimental concerns,

and close personal relationships. Moreover, individuals within a gemeinschaft are bound together by shared beliefs and shared physical space.

So as we prepare to kickoff this parish fundraiser for the 57th time, our own "gelbeschaffung", yes we look to raise funds that are utilized to benefit local outreach, programming, and fund the church's operations and its restoration, as well as any other extraordinary projects that come along unexpectedly such as the elevator mechanical failure. And last Sunday provided overwhelming proof. I had the pleasure of joining Fr. Steve, Ms. Gemo, and our long-time parishioner, choir member/cantor, Jeanette Heiner, at her class reunion of the high school "pioneer" class of 1954. What a great group of alumni who get together every year. Not only do they gather from all over the city, state, and country as part of their small "gemeinschaft", they also understand the need

for the "gelbeschaffung" as they bring their annual contribution for our parish educational endowment. The common theme of all their remembrances and conversations that afternoon was that they owed who they had become to this parish community that for the last 121 years has provided elementary education and did provide high school education for 69 years until 2019.

Alumni, former and current faculty and staff continue to be a big part of our parish community. You will see many of them

You will see many of them in roles volunteering over the Oktoberfest weekend along with former and current school parents. Toss in for good measure parish staff and parishioners with no connection to our school, all these groups are making it happen from set up to tear down, to being cashiers and bartenders, running kid's activities and helping with security. Together we achieve it, together we enjoy it, together we all benefit from it, together we create the "gemeinschaft". 

Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 55:6-9 | Phil 1:20c-24, 27a | Mt 20:1-16a



Today's readings should bring us great joy. They are a reminder that our Lord may have high standards, but he is also "generous in forgiving" and "near to all who call upon him." In the Gospel, we hear the parable of the laborers in the vineyard. Some work all day while others arrive at the last hour. However, all are paid the same. Similarly, we can all receive God's heavenly reward - whether we are faithful Catholics since birth or converts in our final hour. This parable may evoke mixed feelings for those who see themselves as the laborers who have toiled all day and wonder why their reward is not greater. But rather than making us jealous, this parable should make us rejoice: How wonderful that everyone has the opportunity for everlasting life with the Lord! And what great comfort to know that if we falter and lose our way, it is never too late to return to God.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Sometimes, knowing that we are the recipients of God's bountiful mercy, we can be tempted to lead a life focused mostly on worldly pleasures. To paraphrase St. Augustine: Make me holy Lord ... just not yet! Of course we know this isn't the right attitude or approach to life, but it's certainly tempting. Let's return to the message of the Gospel for a moment. Yes, the Lord is generous in giving all the workers the same wage. But perhaps equally as important is that we are called to be workers in the Lord's vineyard, and what an honor and privilege that is! Serving in the Lord's kingdom here on earth is not drudgery; it is life-giving and fills us with God's love and grace. Let us recall the words of St. Paul in today's Letter to the Philippians. Although he longs to "depart this life and be with Christ," he knows that staying here on earth means "fruitful labor for me." Let us also strive to keep our eyes on the Lord and labor in his field for as long as we are able.

PRAY The first reading from Isaiah reminds us that the Lord works in ways we can't understand: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord." Let us ask God this week for the fortitude to reorient our thoughts and ways to his will, not ours, so as to "conduct [ourselves] in a way worthy of the gospel of Christ."

Not only were they gifted healers, but they refused to charge for their services. As they explained, "We treat the infirm by the power of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and take no payment for rendering aid to the sick, because our Lord commanded His disciples, 'Freely have you received, freely give.'" How have you been blessed by God, and how can you share that with others?

Now on tour

Today is World Tourism Day. According to the United Nations, the tourism sector employs one in every 10 people on Earth, and millions more benefit economically from tourism, though the wealth generated isn't always shared equitably. For tourists, exploring new places and enjoying favorite ones can be exhilarating—but bad behavior can ruin a trip. Keeping an attitude of openness and gratitude, as well as respect for local people and customs while on vacation or a tour can transform the experience. Archbishop Rino Fisichella of the Vatican's Dicastery for Evangelization wrote in anticipation of today's observance, "A tourism that respects the person and the environment opens the way to perceiving the goodness of the Father who reaches out to everyone with his love." It's hard to imagine a better souvenir than that.

You may have heard the old English Christmas song about a Bohemian king who became Saint Wenceslaus, in part because of his great charity. The most famous tale from the charitable king's life was recorded in the carol "Good King Wenceslaus." The king helps a poor man keep from freezing by trodding a path in the snow for him, easing the man's journey to shelter. It ends with an admonishment to do likewise for anyone who suffers and "[you] shall yourselves find blessing." Do a favor for someone in need today, and like Wenceslaus, you will find blessing.

Entertaining angels

Care for strangers has always been a strong imperative in Christianity. Yet in today's highly politicized environment, it is challenging to reach out to strangers who some have deemed to be threats—people like refugees and other marginalized communities. Scripture is clear: "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it." Angels? It's far easier to see angels from the safety of a holy card or a statue. But think for a moment and see if you have at some point encountered an angel through the presence of a stranger.

Christianity, by the book

As early Christianity distanced itself from Judaism, Christians began to lose touch with their faith's deep Jewish roots. Saint Jerome (born around 340) helped to reestablish the link. He learned Hebrew from a Christian monk who had converted from Judaism. More unusual for the time, he studied with Jewish rabbis to gain a better understanding of Hebrew scripture. He then spent 15 years producing the foundational Latin translation of the Hebrew Bible, which we know as the Old Testament. He later said, "For if, as Paul says, Christ is the power of God and the wisdom of God, and if the man who does not know Scripture does not know the power and wisdom of God, then ignorance of Scriptures is ignorance of Christ." Crack open the Good Book today, in honor of a key figure who helped shape it.

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EVERY CHILD MATTERS IS ALSO KNOWN AS ORANGE SHIRT DAY. It is a day of awareness that

is celebrated on September 30th in the United States and Canada. Orange Shirt Day originated, and continues to encourage, conversations about residential schools on an international scale, as well as fostering meaningful discussions on the impact and

legacies of the abuses of residential schools. The orange shirt was selected to represent this day by one of our Native American Elders, Phyllis (Jack) Webstad, and her orange shirt, which was made and given to her by her grandmother but taken away upon her arrival at the Mission School. The orange color reminded Phyllis of her experience and "how my feelings didn't matter, how no one cared and how I felt like I was worth nothing. All of us little children were crying, and no one cared."

The United States government, along with various religious groups, established residential (boarding) schools in the late 1800's. The mission of the schools was to assimilate indigenous children into American culture and life by annihilating Indigenous People's history, languages, and cultures. The Indian Civilization Act Fund of 1819, the Peace Policy of 1869, and various denominations of the Christian Church adopted an Indian boarding school policy with the goal to "Kill the Indian, save the man". Native American children were forcibly removed from their families and communities and forced to stay in these residential schools. Once the Native Child arrived at these boarding schools, their traditional clothing was removed, and they were given an English name. Their hair was cut: girls were given short bob cuts and boys were given buzz cuts. For Native people, hair is considered sacred. Children were forbidden to speak their language and express/celebrate their cultural beliefs. They encountered emotional, physical, and sexual abuse in these institutions. They were separated from their families for long periods of time, sometimes for several years, and they were taught that

their native culture was inferior. Many children never returned home, and many families were never notified of their child's death. Many children never received a proper burial and were left in unmarked graves. The search for these unmarked graves and the restoration of the remains to their families continues to this day. The last boarding school in the United States closed in 1996.

For healing to truly happen for our Native American people, the whole truth must be heard and shared. Boarding Schools and Day Schools have inflicted generational trauma on our people. As a ministry of St. Benedict Parish, we, the Saint Kateri Center, are grateful for St. Benedict's support and understanding that our Native people were always spiritual people. The parish has embraced us in integrating our culture and traditions with our Catholic faith. As part of our shared ministry, it is important to support our cultural traditions and teachings. St. Kateri Center is a bridge of healing for our Native People and the Catholic Church. We pray for continued healing for our Native American people.

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


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
