Strengths and Challenges

Strengths

- 1. Strong social justice/outreach ministries including a food pantry, soup kitchen, sandwich program, etc.
- 2. Welcoming faith communities/ministries for people of different ethnic backgrounds (Latino, Filipino, Native American), languages, sexual orientations, migration status and incomes.
- 3. Financial strength/savings in many parishes.
- 4. Beautiful, historic church buildings that are located on prominent streets on the northside.
- 5. Parish communities that bring together long-timers ("legacy families") and newcomers.
- 6. Three strong and thriving parish schools.
- 7. Uplifting liturgies at some parishes and a perpetual adoration chapel at Our Lady of Lourdes.
- 8. With many families with young children there are opportunities to form and inspire the next generation of Catholics.
- 9. A history of collaboration among many of the parishes.

Challenges/Opportunities

- 1. Mass attendance at most of the parishes in the Grouping is declining.
- 2. Sacramental preparation numbers are low given the number of children in the parishes and neighborhoods.
- 3. No strategy for reaching renters and other more transient community members.
- 4. Room for improvement in weekend liturgies not all are inspiring.
- 5. Priests are tasked with many administrative responsibilities which lessens the time they have for pastoring their flock.
- 6. How will the many groups/populations be served if we reduce the number of separate parishes/ministry locations?
- 7. Many aging buildings on our parish campuses with lots of deferred maintenance.
- 8. Better engagement with young adults to help them renew their faith/grow as disciples is needed.
- 9. Need to move beyond serving the faithful in the pews to engage with our wider set of neighbors.
- 10. We tend to depend on the same set of (aging) volunteers how to inspire new people to step up and become parish leaders?
